50th Anniversary



The 2019/2020 academic year marked Skyline College's milestone 50th anniversary. To celebrate the momentous occasion, Skyline College launched a full semester of celebratory activities centered around a 50th Anniversary Gala. This fundraising event, attended by over 200 guests in the beautiful new Farallon Room located inside the new Environmental Science Building, succeeded in raising more than \$100,000 to support the Promise Scholars Program and the President's Innovation Fund – a mini-grant process that allows faculty and staff to launch creative and effective approaches to achieving Skyline College's mission, vision and values.

The fundraiser consisted of a cocktail hour, a four coursemeal, a program including a commemorative video, award presentations, a silent auction and dancing. Lloyd LaCuesta, retired broadcaster from KTVU served as the Master of Ceremonies for the evening and San Mateo County Supervisor David Canepa gave an inspirational keynote address advocating for free college and using his platform as an elected official to make a difference in the county. The Gala will be remembered as a special evening full of dancing, celebration, and fun.

A few weeks after the gala, the students, faculty and classified professionals of Skyline College gathered to celebrate the 50th Anniversary at a free campus-wide barbecue celebration. The event featured five food trucks parked throughout campus with a variety of awesome free food to choose from including chicken and waffles and Filipino Burritos – participants lined up for free lunch tickets that they could spend at any truck of their choosing. Many people also walked away with some free 50th anniversary swag from the marketing table to show their Skyline College pride.

Also included were a selection of artworks culled from past gallery exhibitions.

The exhibition facilitated a thoughtful examination of the college's material culture, providing access points to myriad stories that support the institution's narrative, allowing students, staff, faculty, and the community at large to connect meaningfully to, and have a sense of reality of, the past as well as honor the wisdom, voice, and experience of the college's diverse communities and relationships with the broader local and global communities.

For 50 years, Skyline College has been empowering and transforming the people of this community – these events were a small opportunity to give back and give thanks to the people who make that possible every day: the students, faculty and staff of this college.





Accreditation



Accreditation is about examining the ways we accomplish Skyline College's mission: taking a good hard look at our practices, policies and procedures to evaluate the quality of our institution and ensure that we're never settling for the status quo and are consistently innovating for our students.

This year Skyline College, along with sister colleges Cañada College and the College of San Mateo, was officially reaccredited by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC). Skyline College was reaccredited with flying colors, receiving no recommendations for improvement, a rare accomplishment.

Since the college's last accreditation in 2013, the institution has been hard at work transforming itself through the Comprehensive College Redesign, which examines processes and procedures across every facet of the college to remove barriers to student success. That redesign provided the framework for the 2019 accreditation cycle, allowing us to share with the accreditation visiting team our commitment to being a student-ready college.

PREPARING FOR THE SITE VISIT

The Accreditation Site Visit represented an opportunity for Skyline College faculty, staff and administrators to greet their peers from community colleges from around the state and show them what an amazing and inspiring place Skyline College truly is. But preparing for the Accreditation Site Visit takes years of hard work – and we wanted to make sure it was a truly collaborative process.

Over 200 faculty members, staff, administrators and students came together from across the college to create the Institutional Self-Evaluation Report (ISER) – the document that represents Skyline College's own evaluation of our institution. It is an in-depth examination of every aspect of our college done by the people who work and study here. Hundreds of hours of reflection, evidence-gathering, and writing went into the creation of the report to provide the basis upon which the college would be evaluated.

GETTING THE CAMPUS INVOLVED

The key to a successful site visit, beyond creating the ISER, is to ensure that the campus community is involved and prepared. The college created a beautiful Accreditation Quick Guide that provided answers to frequently asked questions and provided a high-level summary of key elements of the ISER. In the year leading up to the site visit, open forums were regularly hosted to inform the campus and get them excited about the visit. And in the month prior to the evaluation team's arrival, the college released a weekly trivia contest – answers could be found within the Quick Guide, and winners received prizes to incentivize participation.

THE SITE VISIT AND REACCREDITATION

During the site visit, the accreditation evaluation team met with the College President, administrators, program coordinators, faculty, classified professionals, students, lead writers of the ISER and members of the SMCCCD Board of Trustees. They also hosted two open forums so that everyone on campus could have direct

access to the team and participate in the process. At the end of the visit, the team announced their decision to forward no recommendations to the ACCJC, and several months later Skyline College received the official letter announcing its successful reaccreditation for another seven years.

The College is especially proud that the ACCJC recognized Skyline College for exemplary performance in "demonstrating a campus-wide commitment to equity, as evidenced by the creation of the Equity Training Series, the Equity Institute, the Equity Summit, and its engagement in the Skyline College Comprehensive Redesign."

"This news from the ACCJC is great validation that our colleges and our district are world-class institutions for quality teaching and learning, upholding high standards of policy and practice and stewarding the resources we have been given by taxpayers," said Karen Schwarz, President of the San Mateo County Community College Board of Trustees. "A stamp of approval from the ACCJC is an assurance to our community that our district and colleges are serving students with integrity and fidelity."



Equity Institute



In 2018, Skyline College launched the Equity Institute (EI) to transform the landscape of higher education by helping colleges develop and sustain institutional approaches to equity and student success. During the 2019/2020 academic year, the EI hosted 360 faculty, classified professionals, and administrators from 32 California Community Colleges at the equity academy, "The Anatomy of a Transformative Course" on November 13-15, 2019 and "Counseling in the Era of Equity" on February 19-21, 2020.

Equity Academies (EA) are immersive professional learning experiences where colleges register "teams" of 10 faculty, staff and administrators to develop strategies for implementing equity centered work at their institutions. Participants who attend EAs can expect to engage in activity-based learning, critical self-reflection, gain tools and resources to improve their practice, and hear from critically acclaimed thought leaders in the areas of equity, social justice, and education.

At the beginning of spring semester, the EI secured the Institutional Effectiveness Partnership Initiative Grant (IEPI) from the State Chancellor's Office. With this support, the EI partnered with the Bay Area Entrepreneur Center to develop a Business Plan and Marketing plan to help communicate the work of the EI to external colleges and organizations. The IEPI simultaneously provided funding to compensate faculty and staff who serve as Equity Academy facilitators and to create an EI Faculty Liaison position. These efforts are key to ensure that the work of the EI is informed by an equity minded faculty perspective.

The EI also facilitated the fourth-annual Equity Training Series (ETS), a program sponsored by the Division of Student Equity and Support Programs. ETS is a semester long intentional sequence of professional development experiences that bring together staff, faculty, and administrators to engage in a teaching and learning experience centered on equity and cultural fluency. On

May 1st, ETS graduated a cohort of 30 Skyline College, faculty, staff and administrators at the ETS Recognition Ceremony. During the ceremony participants presented individual and group projects that were developed integrating ETS concepts and theories into daily practice to advance student success at Skyline College.

In collaboration with Dr. Lauren Ford, Interim Director of Strategic Initiatives and Planning, the EI hosted the inaugural Equity Institute Fellows Program (EI Fellows) on February 22, May 29-May 30, 2020. This cohort included ten highly engaged education practitioners from community colleges throughout the state to engage in three full-day seminars. The EI Fellows curricular pillars included learning the EI's frameworks and concepts, developing leadership/facilitation skills, and provided an opportunity for networking. Developing this community is key to sustaining the work of the EI because as a result of engaging in this experience, EI Fellows are certified Equity Academy Facilitators and have the opportunity to facilitate future equity academies.



INTERNATIONAL STUDENT PROGRAM

From 2019-2020, Skyline College enrolled **309** international students originating from 45 countries.





Skyline College, as part of the community-supported San Mateo County Community College District, continued to transform the strong financial support from the county into an excellent option for those seeking higher education, either locally, within California, or from abroad. Consistent with State Chancellor's Office strategic goals, the District-wide implementation of the Promise Scholars Program entered its second year yielding notable improvements in student persistence and completion rates. Extramural support included the second year of a multiyear grant totaling \$3 million over three years from the State of California for Innovation in Higher Education, as well as more than \$600k at Skyline College resulting from support provided by Assembly Bill 19 (AB19).

In late March 2020, Congress passed the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act which distributed \$14 billion to higher education including \$214 million for Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HIS). Skyline College's allocation totaled more than \$2.4 million and \$181k respectively. Of this support, 75%, more than \$1.8 million is being distributed to students to continue their education. The remaining amount will be invested in professional development and improved technology to expand and strengthen Skyline College's ability to conduct remote/digital instruction.

Skyline College was also awarded \$500,000 to support Improving Online Career Training Education (CTE) Pathways through a grant which aims to increase wages and improve social mobility in a rapidly changing economy. The Improving Online CTE Pathways grant program was developed by the California Virtual Campus – Online Education Initiative (CVC-OEI) with an allocation of \$35 million in one-time funding and with direction from the Board of Governors and Chancellor's Office of the California Community Colleges. The Improving Online CTE Pathways program was designed to leverage existing capabilities within the CCC system, while also integrating together with the CVC-OEI's objectives.

The Skyline College Express shuttle service also was awarded a continuing two-year grant from the San Mateo County Transportation Authority extending through Fiscal Years 2020-2021 and 2021-2022. The service continues to serve students, staff and the community through the generous support from the grant and matched with District/College funds.



Foundation Update



San Mateo County Community Colleges Foundation promotes philanthropy throughout our community, ensuring that everyone in San Mateo County can afford and achieve a higher education at Skyline College, Cañada College, and College of San Mateo. Through the generosity of individual, corporate, and foundation donors, the SMCCCF provides scholarships for San Mateo County Community College District students and funding for programs at the three colleges.

Even during the best of economic times, many students at Skyline College and in the District face significant financial barriers to achieving the dream of completing a college education. Since 1966, the Foundation has been here to help. The SMCCCF distributes over 850 life-changing scholarships annually and supports over 100 programs including the Promise Scholars Program, campus STEM and Veteran's Resource Centers, and various Skyline College departments. Scholarships are awarded in a ceremony each May — a beloved tradition that brings together students, donors, faculty, staff, the Foundation, and friends in gratitude and celebration.

During the COVID-19 pandemic and ensuing economic decline, the Foundation immediately embraced its responsibility to the District's students. The SMCCC Foundation Emergency Fund and the Undocumented Student Fund were immediately established to cover students' most basic needs in this time of crisis. So far, over 1,000 emergency grants have been distributed from both these funds.

In addition to raising funds from its own donors, the Foundation regularly collaborates on fundraising efforts with Skyline College. SMCCCF Executive Director, Tykia Warden, serves on Skyline College's President's Council alongside other corporate and organizational supporters from northern San Mateo County. Moreover, Foundation staff serve on Skyline College's major events working committees, helping to create such events as the annual President's Breakfast and the college's 50th Anniversary Celebration gala.

The SMCCC Foundation wishes to thank the Board of Directors. Their continued partnership and support enhances and strengthens the Foundation's ability to fundraise for all the colleges in the District, including Skyline College.









The ASSC received the leadership and curriculum training needed to develop their vision for a more engaged Skyline College.

The Associated Students of Skyline College (ASSC) had a memorable year of growth, collaboration, education, and community. This student government began the year with just 8 members and an interim advisor before blossoming into a full cabinet with a permanent advisor. The teamwork between the Student Life staff and the original eight resulted in a widely successful special election in the fall with all positions filled, welcoming 17 new members.

At the ASSC's 2019 fall leadership retreat at Camp Monte Toyon, they received the leadership and curriculum training needed to develop their vision for a more engaged Skyline College highlighted by their commitment to creating a better sense of community on campus through intentional programming and support.

That commitment resulted in 34 immersive experiences during fall 2019 alone, double the total from the previous academic year. The campus community participated in different educational activities, student-created exhibits, student-led workshops, film screenings, critical panel dialogues, cultural sharing through tabling and food while hosting engaging speakers like queer Tongan poet-activist - Loa Niumeitolu as their fall 2019 college lecture series speaker. From celebrating Latinx heritage month with low riders, conchas, and pupusas to hosting a traditional Batok tattoo ceremony during Filipinx American history month - the ASSC wanted programming to reflect its students. This resulted in amplifying the voices of the LGBTQIA+ community by creating safe spaces for transformative dialogue and education led by community members, which ultimately led to our district's first-ever "Tonga Day" - where we held a traditional Tongan Kava ceremony facilitated

by a member of the royal family. All of these events were in collaboration with different clubs, departments, programs, organizations on our campus and in our surrounding community.

Our campus also celebrated Black history month with a surprise visit from the cast of the film Last Black Man in San Francisco, and were transitioning into women's history month when the shelter-in-place order occurred. In response, the ASSC created a YouTube channel housing it's collaborative programming – continuing to provide spaces for learning, connecting, and community building through a virtual modality. Highlighted by Dr. Allyson Tintiangco-Cubales and Dr. Jocyl Sacramento as our inaugural virtual college lecture series speakers leading a workshop and featuring Dr. Regina Stanback Stroud in the "Sheroes Amongst Us" women's panel.

Lastly, in spite of COVID19 - the ASSC led its first-ever electronic elections resulting in 600+ students voting, double the totals from prior years. The ASSC looks forward to more engaging years like this in the future.



Building 12 Grand Opening



After two years of construction, the brand new Environmental Science Building at Skyline College opened in September, 2019.

Over 400 people celebrated the momentous occasion at a ribbon cutting event that hosted elected officials from across the region, local community leaders, faculty, staff and lots of students. The energy in the room was palpable as attendees conducted self-guided tours to learn about the environmental design of the building and check out the state-of-the-art classrooms and learning resources.

Speaking to all in attendance, Interim President Jackson stated, "This college has always striven to be at the forefront – to push against the status quo – and move our institution forward together...This Environmental Science Building stands as a symbol of that legacy."

The Environmental Science Building project was years in the making as teams from the district's Facilities Planning, Maintenance & Operations' Division and Skyline College worked closely with DES Architects to determine what was needed in this new space and how it could best serve students and our community. From there, a beautiful design was born and the construction planning set in motion with XL Construction. And slowly, but surely, the building rose up from Vista Point as hundreds of individuals worked countless hours to make it happen.

Dr. Jackson concluded her remarks with a look to the future: "The Environmental Science Building or Building 12, is about looking to the future. It quite literally encourages us to look to the horizon and the world beyond this campus. And, it encourages us to think big and dream even bigger."





Promise Scholars Program

The Promise Scholars Program at Skyline College will enter into its third year of full replication of the City University of New York (CUNY) Accelerated Studies in Associate Programs (ASAP) model. The ASAP model, a comprehensive support program that provides financial, academic and intensive counseling support, has proven to double two-year and three-year graduation rates for participating students and more than 45,000 students have benefited from the ASAP model in the CUNY system, to-date.

Skyline College was the first California Community College to attempt replication of the model through its Promise Scholars Program. The program began ASAP replication with a little more than 500 students in its Fall 2018 cohort, and has expanded to serve 750 first-time, full-time students annually at Skyline College. The Fall 2018 cohort has just finished up their second year, and the Promise Scholars Program is seeing very positive results, with initial data indicating that the two-year completion rates (graduation and/or transfer) will match the ASAP benchmark of 25%, and more than double Skyline College's historical two-year graduation and transfer rates for participating students. Students in the Fall 2018 and Fall 2019 cohort have also persisted at higher rates than comparison students at the college.

The Promise Scholars Program has had the opportunity to expand its reach through the generous support of the Chancellor's Innovation Grant. The Promise Scholars Program is now replicated across the San Mateo County Community College District (SMCCCD), serving 2,000 Promise Scholars annually across the district's three colleges. In addition, the grant has supported technical assistance for three additional California Community Colleges – Pasadena City College, Lake Tahoe Community College, and Cuesta College – to explore replication of the Promise Scholars Program model at their campuses. SMCCCD has hired WestED evaluators to support a comprehensive evaluation of the program and its impact for students, but from initial indicators, the Promise Scholars Program is having a meaningful impact on students' lives and increasing student completion rates at Skyline College and beyond.

Dual Enrollment



Skyline College's Strategic Partnerships and Workforce Development division has led collaborative efforts across the campus to expand high school partnerships throughout San Mateo County culminating in the launch of the comprehensive Dual Enrollment program at Skyline College.

Since inception, the program has increased engagement and established strategic partnerships and formal College and Career Access Pathways Agreements with Jefferson Union High School District, South San Francisco Unified District, San Mateo Union High School District and Sequoia Union High School District. Students at these high school have the opportunity to take college classes at their high schools during their academic day in a variety of pathways and transfer preparation courses including biotechnology, network engineering, child development, automotive, languages and more.

Dual enrollment strives to increase access to college for students who have not previously viewed that as an option and to address inequities that may have existed in their educational journey. The program also develops seamless pathways from high school to community college career education and transfer pathways and reduces the educational debt of students as a result of their post-secondary educational experience. Finally, it improves high school graduation rates and high school student overall college and career readiness.

Dual enrollment strives to increase access to college for students who have not previously viewed that as an option.

The program led to 1,200 new enrollments in the 18/19 academic year and just over 2,000 enrollments in the 19/20 academic year with plans to grow to nearly 3,000 enrollments in the 20/21 academic year.

Core elements of the program include: high touch service-centered support and on-boarding for students, integrated strategies and practices that remove barriers for success, and cross-collaborative work teams made up of Skyline College faculty and High School partner teachers.

The Comprehensive Dual Enrollment Program continues to expand strategic partnerships across our communities and to advance the key priorities of Skyline College and the San Mateo County Community College District.



COVID-19 Response



The spring 2020 semester was one of particular challenge, resilience, and hope. The COVID-19 Pandemic dramatically altered the landscape of our lives, and as of publications, continues to do so. Education across the state, nation and the globe was forced to adapt to a new reality – remote learning, online classes, zoom meetings and more were suddenly the new normal. Students, faculty and staff had to adapt at the drop of a hat as a shelter-in-place order took effect in mid-March, and instructors needed to find new ways to ensure students would finish out the semester.

But amidst these sudden and significant challenges came a response from our district community that deserves recognition and commendation. Faculty, staff and administrators came together to ensure that instruction and student services would continue in a new modality, and students by and large made the bold choice to continue their higher education in the face of real challenges. We highlight a few examples of the work being done by students, faculty and staff below:

FINDING NEW WAYS TO CONNECT TO CAMPUS COMMUNITY

The pandemic crisis has affected Skyline College students in various different ways, but one common feeling is missing the connection to the campus - being around other people, experiencing events, and opportunities to connect with community members. But the Associated Students of Skyline College stepped up to offer new ways to stay connected.

The ASSC led immersive virtual experiences like workshops on different cultures, critical community collaborations, and student-centered dialogue. They have highlighted how to access critical student services on social media and are actively working with campus partners and community connections to continue providing virtual opportunities for education, connection, and community.

PROVIDING FOOD ASSISTANCE TO THE LOCAL COMMUNITY

The San Mateo County Community College District, in partnership with Second Harvest of Silicon Valley, started holding weekly free drive-thru emergency food distribution on Fridays at the College of San Mateo (CSM) campus. Our goal has been to increase access to healthy and nutritious food for

students, their families and our community, while also following COVID-19 health and safety guidelines.


The program serves roughly 1,000 families each week, which each family receiving 35-45 lbs. of food per visit. Over the past eleven weeks, nearly 355,000 pounds of food has been distributed to about 9,100 families. This has offset an estimated \$532,000 in food costs for our students and community.

TRANSITIONING TO REMOTE LEARNING

Faculty and students alike were faced with the challenge of transitioning from in-person learning to a fully online modality. The district cancelled classes for four days so that faculty could swiftly transition and students could prepare for this new reality. Skyline College distributed hundreds of laptops and Wi-Fi hotspots for students who needed them and faculty swiftly adapted their curriculum so their students could finish the semester successfully. Skyline College's Center for Transformative Teaching and Learning was instrumental in providing professional development resources and trainings for faculty who needed assistance in updating their classes, and they remain a critical resource as we move into the fall semester.



STEM Center Opening



On Monday, November 18, 2019, over 200 people gathered for the inaugural ribbon cutting to celebrate the opening of the Science, Technology, and Health STEM Center at Skyline College.

Launching with seed funding through Skyline College's STEM Pathways Grant, the STEM Center works to engender a vibrant community of students, faculty and staff all supporting each other to foster student success within Science, Technology, Health, Engineering, and Math courses.

The three large touch-screen TV's in the space flexed their potential by switching back and forth between their two key functionalities. The first functionality is connecting to computers through screen-sharing (either via WiFi or cable connection).

Second, converting to digital whiteboards allowing guests to write and draw welcoming messages and fun exercise problems.

Many students in various clubs took this opportunity to showcase some of their current research projects/interests. The Astronomy Club, Engineering & Robotics Club, SAE (Society of Automotive Engineers), and WISER! (Women In Science and Engineering Represent!) were all in attendance. On display were a series of telescopes, engineering simulation models, biotechnology lab equipment, a distillation lab demonstration (synthesizing crude oil), computer graphics models, student research posters, math games/puzzles, and a solar boat built by students.



The STEM Center will serve the students by providing a space to collaborate, learn, and connect. With the additional space and immediate vicinity to faculty offices, students gain the opportunity to work closely with their faculty and mentors. The STEM Center also looks to rethink how office hours are conducted by hosting them so that faculty meets the students where they are at, literally.

From inception to design to construction, development of the STEM Center at Skyline College was realized through the dedication and hard work of a diverse set of teams and individuals throughout the College, district and design construction partners.



Pister Scholarship Winner

While growing up in Nigeria, Pearl Ibeanusi knew she wanted to be a leader, but as a woman she found roadblocks everywhere. "I have always pictured myself as a manager or leader in an organization," says Pearl, "but I was afraid to share this...in a country that does not foster women's education, let alone their leadership." But when Pearl immigrated to the United States, she vowed to pursue her education and prove to herself that she had what it takes to succeed.

Years of hard work later and Pearl has graduated from Skyline College with an associate degree, and is also the recipient of the prestigious Pister Scholarship, awarded to just 13 community college students nationwide who wish to transfer to UC Santa Cruz, show exceptional achievement despite adverse socio-economic status and have demonstrated a commitment to assisting and improving the lives of others.

The road to transfer hasn't been easy, but Pearl has, time and again, shown that perseverance and determination can push you through any challenge. Raising six children while pursuing her education, Pearl found Skyline College through taking courses at the South San Francisco Adult school where professor Serena Chu pushed her to consider enrolling.

Pearl did enroll, and found success by making the most of several key campus organizations, including TRiO, ASTEP and the Women's Mentoring and Leadership Academy where Professor Daniel Powell was instrumental in sharing leadership skills, building confidence and improving communication.

Pearl also became active in the Associated Students of Skyline College, serving first as Commissioner of Finance, then as vice president and finally as Student Body President where she sat on the College Governance Council, among others. For Pearl, ASSC was critical in helping her get involved with decision making and connected her with college leadership.
