As a result, there were 330 people at the event, held on March 26, the highest number ever. Open Forum coming: plans for renovation of the landscaping, parking, gateways, and other site work at Skyline

President Morrow is convening an Open Forum on Skyline's landscaping, parking, gateways and other site work:

The Open Forum will be an opportunity for everyone to hear the latest about planning for the work that will be taking place starting this summer, including landscaping, parking, gateways and other site work. The gateways to the college at College Drive and Sharp Park will be enhanced. The central areas of campus will all be reshaped, including the quads between Buildings 1 and 2, 2 and 3, 3 and 4N, and 7 and 8, and the walkway between Buildings 2 and 5. The parking areas will be restructured and many sections of the campus will be re-landscaped. There will be discussion about the existing trees and where trees will be coming down; the guiding principles used in selecting the new trees, shrubs and ground covers; parking for students, staff, the disabled and visitors; and construction logistics. This will be an opportunity for people to see the draft plans and to comment upon them or flag issues that may not have come up yet.

The Kababayan Program presents the 5th Annual Pilipino Cultural Night — *BROWNOUT!*, April 30-May 1, 2000

Skyline continues its annual tradition of Pilipino Cultural Nights with its latest production, *BROWNOUT!*, on Thursday, April 30 and Friday, May 1, 2009 in the Main Theater at Skyline College, 3300 College Drive, San Bruno. Doors open at 7 pm for both shows. Pilipino Cultural Night (PCN) is a student-run event that is open to the community to celebrate the Filipino American experience, showcasing the cultural dances and traditional music from the Philippines as



well as elements of the Filipino American culture. The show is based upon the work of students enrolled in English 104: "Applied English Skills in Cultural Production," who are responsible for the writing, directing, producing, advertising, acting, singing, dancing, stage/technical crew, and prop/set design and construction of the show. The dances are performed by members of the class as well as the Kababayan Dance Troupe of Skyline College. In this year's story, BROWNOUT!, in the spring of 1939, two sisters, Reina and Mila Santarina receive word that their father Alberto tragically dies in an accident in the Philippines. Reina and Mila's presence has been requested to settle to the family estate in what is now the historic Tandang Sora district of Quezon City, Philippines, where the ancestral family home is located. While in the Philippines, the sisters find out they have inherited not only the house, but also its secrets. Reina and Mila learn that while it's important to know everything you can about who you are and where you are from, some things are just better left in the dark. Students in the Kababayan Program and Filipino Student Union, along with advisors Liza Erpelo, Melanie Espinueva, Marisa Mariano, and Nate Nevado, have been hosting events and fundraisers to help pay for the costs and expenses of the production. Proceeds from this year's PCN will benefit future productions and go toward scholarships for the students in the Kababayan Program and Filipino Student Union. The event is a unique and wonderful opportunity to learn a bit more about Filipino and Filipino American history and culture and to see Skyline's phenomenal students in action.
