College Council update from January 24 meeting

1) ASSC update: Silvia Cervantes reported that the Associated Students are happily settling into their new office and meeting spaces on the second floor of the new Student Center. They are also making plans for activities and events this spring.

- 2) Accreditation update: Ray Hernandez reported that the writing teams are refining the second draft which they completed just before the holidays—filling in holes, securing evidence, refining the "planning agendas." They expect to publish the draft for college-wide review and discussion in mid-February.
- 3) Educational and Facilities Master Planning Project update: Vicki Morrow reminded everyone of the Open forum on the "bridging documents" related to our next round of building and renovation on January 31 (see the item above in *Skyline Shines*). Official names for our buildings and building numbers for those yet to be built are being established. The Council reviewed a draft list, which will be discussed by the Educational and Facilities Master Plan Task Force next week, and then finalized.
- 4) Balanced Score Card: Cathy Hasson reviewed the Balanced Score Card and noted that we are currently implementing it. As part of the process it (the outcomes and benchmarks particularly) will be reviewed annually along with our year-end report on work plan activities. - 5) Fresh Look Project update: Sandy Irber reviewed the proposed changes to the printed class schedule which will be implemented for the Summer 2007 publication. She thanked the Fresh Look Advisory Group and the many other groups on campus which provided input to the process of improving the schedule, including the ASSC, the Campus Ambassadors and the Outreach Committee.
- 6) Plus/Minus grading system: Carla Campillo reported that the Academic Senate will be holding a college-wide forum for discussion of a resolution on this subject from the CSM faculty.
- 7) SEEED plans for April 18-19 diversity event: Vicki Morrow reviewed the plans for the April event, and for book discussion groups around James McBrides's "The Color of Water." The committee hopes that the book will be woven into the work of appropriate classes but also that there will be discussion of it on campus for faculty and staff, along with students. Plans are being finalized for speakers and music in connection with the theme—"Facinating Rhythms—Who are We?"
- 8) M.E.E.T. on Common Ground training: Carla reported that a subgroup of SEEED in collaboration with the MOT Alumni group is working with Gerry Frassetti on plans for the training; the date has not been set yet but it will take place this semester.
- 9) Compendium of Committees: Vicki noted that there is an updated version of the college's list of committees, their charges, and their membership for Spring 2007and it is now on the web at http://www.skylinecollege.edu/committees/index.html
- **10) Next meeting:** February 28. At that meeting the Council will take final action on the proposed new Vision and Mission statements.

BANK

"Bank" works this way. You earn up to ______ (your choice) in your bank savings account. At the end of the semester, points can be withdrawn to offset test scores. To earn bank points you can read a thought provoking and poignant book, <u>The Color of Water, A Black Man's Tribute to His White Mother</u> by James McBride. Here's a little excerpt:

James McBride grew up one of twelve siblings in the all-black housing projects of Red Hook, Brooklyn, the son of a black minister and a woman who would not admit she was white. The object of McBride's constant embarrassment, and his continuous fear for her safety, his mother was an inspiring figure, who through sheer force of will saw her dozen children through college. McBride was an adult before he discovered the truth about his mother: the daughter of a failed itinerant Orthodox rabbi in rural Virginia, she had run away to Harlem, married a black man, and founded an all-black Baptist church in her living room in Red Hook. In this remarkable memoir, she tells in her own words the story of her past. Around her narrative, James McBride has written a powerful portrait of growing up, and a meditation on race and identity. (Penguin Group USA).

In essay form answer any two of the following questions:

1. Discuss Ruth McBride's refusal to reveal her past and how that influenced her children's sense of themselves and their place in the world. How has your knowledge—or lack thereof—about your family background shaped your own self-image? Use references to the book.

2. The McBride children's struggle with their identities led each to his or her own "revolution." Is it also possible that that same struggle led them to define themselves through professional achievement? What has been your own "revolution?"

3. Several of the McBride children became involved in the civil rights movement. Do you think that this was a result of the times in which they lived, their need to belong to a group that lent them a solid identity, or a combination of these factors? Has discrimination or prejudice against your family or yourself pushed you to become involved in social justice issues?

4. While reading the book, were you curious about how Ruth McBride Jordan's remarkable faith had translated into the adult lives of her children? Do you think that faith is something that can be passed on from one generation to the next or do you think that faith that is instilled too strongly in children eventually causes them to turn away from it? Use personal experiences. (Penguin Group, USA)
