Skyline College Earth Week Success

Earth Day, April 22nd kicked off Skyline College Earth Week a series of interactive events led by Skyline College Environmental Club.

Tuesday April 23rd, students learned about the benefits of resource conservation. Environmental Club sponsored a screening of the motion picture *The Lorax*.

The Green Fair on Wednesday April 24th, attracted organizations and business with environmental programs and services in the community. Organizations sponsored booths featuring interactive displays. Event participants included: PG&E, Schneider Electric, San Mateo County Environmental Health, Recology San Bruno, American Cetacean Society, Tuolumne River Trust, and RecycleWorks. Automotive Technology displayed their clean energy vehicles: a Toyota Hybrid and the new Nissan Leaf.



Energy Systems Technology and Management program sponsored a booth featuring their new degree program, Associate in Science in Energy Systems Technology and Management. Faculty Celia Canfield and coordinators Aaron Wilcher and Anthony Lew showcased a solar panel display and educated students about solar technology and building science. Instructor Bruce Greenstein, gave tours of Skyline College's Solar and Building Science Learning Center in Pacific Heights.

Campus clubs showed their support for the environment with displays on plants, club research projects and efforts to increase sustainability. In attendance were Anthropology Club, Phi Theta Kappa, Science and Research Club, Environmental Club, Vet Club, and From the Ground Up. Environmental Science 100 students displayed their semester projects on polar issues in a symposium style.

Keynote speaker Captain Scott Shackleton engaged almost 120 students and faculty in a lecture on Antarctica: the last frontier. Recounting the expeditions of his namesake and relative Earnest Shackleton, Captain Scott Shackleton spoke about the effect of climate change on the Antarctica and global sea levels. He shared the details of his work in Antarctica and that he is the first Shackleton to make it to the South Pole.



Thursday April 24th showcased student artists as they created sculptures in the UPcycled art contest. Students worked against the clock to create sculptures from recycled materials collected around campus. The art is currently showcased in Building 7 in front of the SMT Office. 


Friday April 25th ended Earth Week with the Skyline College Research Symposium put on by the Skyline College Science and Research Club.



YEP District-Wide Business Plan Competition



Skyline College’s Youth Entrepreneurship Program (YEP), in conjunction with, Cañada College and College of San Mateo, is currently holding its first district-wide business plan competition. For the first time, students enrolled in any one of the districts colleges can participate in the same competition.

Students that participant in the competition will receive one-on-one coaching and mentoring from business owners and faculty to refine and perfect their business plans. Cash prizes will be awarded to three winning business plans to help support their start-up business ideas.



On May 15, 2013, YEP is hosting the Business Plan Competition Finals Round & Award Ceremony. The Finals Round will be held in room 6206 from 5pm to 7pm. Students will have the opportunity to present or “pitch” their business plans to a panel of industry judges from various business backgrounds, and the chance to receive immediate feedback and suggestions to include in their plans. As of May 8th (the competition deadline) a total of nine business plans were qualified for the semi-final round. Plans that advance on to the finals round will be in the running for cash prizes.

The First Annual Skyline College Research Symposium

The First Annual Skyline College Research Symposium held on April 26th was a huge success. The day started off with a Keynote Address from Dr. John Dueber, Assistant Professor of Bioengineering at U.C. Berkeley. Dovetailing with Skyline College's Earth Week celebration, Professor Dueber discussed bioengineering approaches to creating cost-effective and sustainable biofuels.

For the day's main event, Skyline College students presented their research at a juried poster session. Forty-four students were authors on a total of 23 professional-quality posters. Hundreds of other students, faculty, and staff gathered in the cafeteria to view their work. Many of our students have won national prizes for their research over the years, including some who were presenting. The poster session was an opportunity for these students to proudly share their work with their own campus and to inspire other students to pursue independent research projects as well.



Next students attended a forum where they were able to get career and education advice from eight science, math, and technology professionals: Dr. Erin Quealy (physics researcher), Kylin Johnston (biology and chemistry lab technician), Chris Johnson (environmental consultant and geology and geography educator), James Selvidge (mathematician and computer programmer) Brian Daniel (respiratory therapist), Dr. Charles Leggett (high-energy physics researcher), John Freedman (high school and community college educator), Chris Copeland (lab technician, instrumentation specialist, and sales person), and Miguel Suarez (engineer and senior facilities manager). Dr. Carina Anttila-Suarez moderated the event.

An awards reception wrapped up the day on campus. Thank you cards and t-shirts were given to the guest presenters and the winning student posters were named. Four honorable mentions, each receiving \$25, were named: Jenny Vo Phami (for her work with Shari Bookstaf and Chip Chandler), Tin Ching Lok (for her work with Dr. Carmen Velez), Monzerrat Herrera (for her work with Dr. Christine Case), and Michael Zarubin (for his work with Ilkka Koskelo). Second prize (\$100) was awarded to a group of four students working with Ilkka Koskelo: Ali Zulfi-khar, Imtiaz Zulfi-khar, Allan Wai, and Mathew Ennis. First prize (\$200) was awarded to Krista Barnard for her work with Dr. Nick Kapp. Thank you to all of the SMT division members who contributed their time for planning and executing the event as well as their money for the students' prizes!



The event was planned by the Skyline College Science and Research Club and co-sponsored by Skyline College Go Green and SACNAS. Due to a coordinating error at the symposium, the plant walk on Sweeney Ridge that was planned with Anne Gearhart has been rescheduled for May 10, 2013 and will serve as the end of year celebration for the Science and Research Club. On Thursday, May 2nd, Skyline College's Transfer Center hosted a meeting with local high school counselors. Nine counselors from six different campuses attended the meeting.

When looking at transfer through the lens of Completion by Design, it was identified that working more closely and collaboratively with high school counselors to prepare future Skyline College students for transfer before they get here will help increase students chances to successfully transfer. The purpose of this meeting was to build collaborations, inform counselors of important resources and brainstorm opportunities on how to support high school seniors who will be incoming Skyline College students.

Dr. Joi Blake provided a warm welcome to the counselors along with a preview of the Skyline College Promise. Counselors were then presented with information on Transfer Center resources and were given an overview of support programs. An update was given on recent trends and challenges students are facing when they are planning to transfer, including changes to financial aid. The meeting ended with a discussion on how the Transfer Center and Skyline College can support high school students prepare for transfer. Several ideas were made that will be implemented in the upcoming academic year.

Counselors had a lot of great feedback on our programs, were energized to partner together with Skyline College and the Transfer Center and hope to continue meetings like this one each Spring semester.

Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Center Returns over \$297,000 to the Community!



The Business Division and SparkPoint at College partner with the United Way of the Bay Area's [Earn It Keep Save It Program](#) (EKS) to provide free IRS Certified Tax Preparation for qualified members of our community - households making less than \$51,000 per year. By filing a tax return, eligible taxpayers are able to claim a number of credits, including the [Earned Income Tax Credit](#) (EITC) which can amount to as much as \$5,891 per family. This year's VITA center at Skyline College increased the number of returns transmitted to 284, a 33.33% increase of over last year resulting in \$297,000 in refunds!

While most EKS sites throughout the Bay Area utilize volunteers, our site takes advantage of our instructional programs to provide excellent learning opportunities for our students. Accounting students may prepare for IRS certification by completing Accounting 665. The course includes a lab requirement where IRS certified students assist tax filers under the supervision of their instructor, John Miller. The community benefits from a high quality tax preparation service and students acquire both certification and experience for their resumes making them more competitive candidates for good jobs.



In collaboration with WestEd's Community College Paraprofessional Preparation Project (CCPPP), the ECE/EDU program hosted its fifth annual Early Intervention Conference on "Sensory Affect, Play, and the DIR/Floortime Model." Keynote speakers included Dr. Rosemary White (OTR and faculty at the Interdisciplinary Council on Developmental and Learning Disorders), Dr. Pamela Wolfberg (professor at San Francisco State University), and Dr. Cecilia Breinbauer (M.D. and Director of the Interdisciplinary Council on Developmental and Learning Disorders). Workshop and break-out sessions were conducted by top local professionals, including Todd Wanerman, James Adams, Kathryn Basco, Kathy Small, Rosemary White, Robin Hague, Chrissy D'Agostino, and Brenda Bachechi. Skyline College students were joined by local high schools and SFSU graduate students, professionals and community members to learn about play-based intervention strategies for children with Autistic Spectrum Disorders, occupational therapy targeting sensory integration, and support strategies for young children in their natural environments. At nearly 450 participants, it was the most successful conference yet!

Reed, U.S. Ambassador to Fiji, Kiribati, Nauru, Tonga, and Tuvalu, in San Francisco.

Students Explore Career and Education Options at *Gateway to College and Careers*

SparkPoint at Skyline College hosted *Gateway to College and Careers*, a one-day conference where students in the San Mateo County Court and Community schools explored career and education opportunities. Skyline College, San Mateo County Office of Education, and San Mateo County Probation Department partnered to produce the event on March 21, 2013. More than 120 students from San Mateo County Court and Community Schools completed a career assessment process prior to attending the event. During the event, students met with professionals representing multiple employment sectors to practice interview skills. Students also learned about Career and Technical Education programs. Students from the following schools participated at the conference: Baden High School, Camp Glenwood, Gateway Community School, Sequoia Community Day School, Sequoia Union Independent Studies, South San Francisco Community Day School, Thornton High School and San Mateo County Youth Services Center.

Over 75 adults volunteered their time to support students' connections to career success. Professionals (representing career clusters including Building Trades and Construction Technology; Business, Entrepreneurship, and Hospitality; Health Sciences, Human Services, and Early Childhood Development; Media, Technology, and Journalism; and Public Services) provided students with direct contacts within their chosen career pathways. Additional community partners contributed skills or expertise to the program including attorneys from the San Mateo County Private Defender Program. Employers provided resume critiques and mock interviews.

Nate Nevado, co-founder of Skyline College's acclaimed Rock the School Bells conference, connected with students by telling his story of realizing his dream to integrate hip hop into higher education. Finally, students participated in presentations and campus tours by representatives of the Automotive and Cosmetology Departments, and the Early Childhood Development and Green Construction programs.

More Free or Low-Cost Online Textbooks Available

Increasing numbers of quality online textbooks are being made available through several state- and foundation-sponsored projects. The [Open Course Library](#), a project in Washington State, has created free or low-cost digital textbooks for use in 81 popular community college courses. Books and related materials created for the project are free for anyone to use online. Printed copies are available for about \$20 each. The project was jointly financed by Washington state and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Another initiative, [College Open Textbooks](#), has peer-reviewed more than 100 open textbooks for use in community college courses and identified more than 250 others for consideration. Open textbooks are freely available for use without restriction and can be downloaded or printed from web sites and repositories. They also provide training for instructors adopting open resources. The Skyline College New Student Orientation has been restructured. Our previous format, which required students to attend a five hour session, has been reduced to two hours. The Orientation is designed to provide students with the information, resources, and tools needed to be successful at Skyline College. Orientation is a part of the “Getting Started” process at Skyline College and typically takes place after the English and Math Placement tests are completed. Upon completion of Orientation, students schedule an appointment to meet with a counselor to help them select the appropriate classes and plan their academic career. After attending the counseling appointment students are given a date on which they can then register for their classes. Some of the topics covered during orientation include Skyline College Policies and Procedures, Campus Resources and Learning Communities, Code of Conduct, How to use WebSmart, and Understanding Placement Tests.

TRiO SSS Project Visits UCSC! UCR! CPP!

What a month April has been for TRiO SSS project students! They have taken the opportunity to visit three outstanding California institutions of higher education (IHE) including:

University of California at Santa Cruz is ranked 7th in the World as best universities less than 50 years old; and is ranked second for research influence, i.e., the number of times researchers cited UCSC professors

University of California at Riverside is ranked 8th in the nation the most racial-ethnic diversity and 46th in national as best public schools; and

California Polytechnic University at Pomona is one of only seven polytechnic universities nationwide, and is known for its learn-by-doing philosophy, it is tied for **15th in the nation for top undergraduate programs in engineering amongst all private and public schools**

You might ask the question, “Why are campus visits so important?” The answer is campus visits allows TRiO SSS students to experience first-hand the campus environment, evaluate the academics, see housing and learn about the social life for themselves. While brochures, catalogues, websites and presentations by college representatives coming to Skyline College do help to form an opinion of a school, seeing it in person is the best way for a student to know if a campus is the right place for her or him. Each TRiO SSS campus visit involves the students walking the campus, seeing a room in the residence hall, tasting the food, and attending an information session presented by IHE transfer staff.

Finding the right IHE is not just about where the student will get the best education, but it is also about the place the student will call home for the near future. Just as you would not purchase a house without walking through it first, a student should do the same by walking IHEs. The TRiO SSS project wants our students to find a place where they can learn, work, eat, and play—a place where they feel comfortable as a member of a community.

The TRiO SSS project staff believes while visiting campuses does indeed assist the student to narrow down her or his choices, it can also serve as a real motivator to do well academically as well as in extracurricular activities while attending Skyline College. In addition, it gives the student a clearer picture about IHE environments and is an ideal opportunity for students and TRiO SSS counselors to talk about this very important decision. The TRiO SSS campus visits are having an impact of the seventy-five TRiO SSS students slated to participate in the 2012 – 13 Skyline College graduation ceremony, forty-one are transferring to an IHE.

A representative from the State University of São Paulo (UNESP), Prof. Jorge Muniz, visited the Skyline College campus on April 22, 2013 for partnership meetings with the college President, Dr. Regina Stanback-Stroud and the Vice President of Instruction, Dr. Sarah Perkins. Following meetings with administration, Prof. Muniz was taken on a brief tour of some of the Tech Programs that Skyline College has to offer.



On April 23rd the CITD and UNESP held a special Global, Green/Tech Program Roundtable discussion at the College to identify immediate programs and areas of collaboration. The roundtable was attended by Skyline College faculty, staff and students. Presentations were given by Jorge Muniz along with relevant deans, staff, and faculty to discuss the opportunities the institutions can offer one another. Several programs and departments gave presentations at the roundtable including: ESOL/Technology Ed Programs, Green/Automotive Technology Entrepreneurship Programs, Environmental Technology, Math/Science Technology and Sports/Exchange Recruitment.

Jorge Muniz, who is also the Vice Director of UNESP's International Program and Skyline College administration have been working on a partnership involving Skyline College's various green/tech and global programs. Presently, there are ongoing discussions to develop curriculum exchange and study abroad programs, dual degree opportunities and international contract education for the two institutions.



The partnership development has focused on the following programs: Automotive Engineering, the African Diaspora Program, Bio-Technology, Entrepreneurship programs, ESL for Technical Studies, and Student Exchange programs.

This partnership with UNESP, will assist Skyline College with its mission to globalize the campus community and will give current and future students' more education opportunities.

Send submission to skylineshines@smccd.edu

- **Submit your article by 3:00 p.m. on Thursdays; articles received after this time will appear in the following week's issue.**
- Place your submission in a Word document with your pictures pasted in the document.
- Use medium sized pictures that are equal to 1/4 or 1/2 of a page. Do not place pictures next to each other, they must be on separate lines.
- Use Times New Roman 12pt. font that is justified to the left for the body of the article.
- Please make sure your article is single spaced.
- Don't forget to add a headline/title using 18 pt. bold font that is justified to the center
- Use the following commonly accepted abbreviations: a.m. or p.m. (i.e. ³The event will be held from 8:00 a.m. 1:30 p.m.² ³The workshop is scheduled to run from 9:30 a.m. Noon.²
- Spell out numbers of one or two words. Use figures for numbers that require more than two words to spell out. (i.e., ³Almost eight years ago I began taking ceramics courses.² And ³I counted 176 records on the shelf.²).
- If a sentence begins with a number, spell out the number or rewrite the sentence.
- Use the month, day, a comma and the year to indicate the date (i.e., ³March 4, 2011² not ³March 4th, 2011 or March 2nd, 2011²).
- Add the word College when you refer to the name Skyline (i.e., Skyline College instead of Skyline).
