Emi Matsuura, VP of Operations, interviews former Chapter Vice-president Grace Cruz. Grace graduated from U.C., Berkeley. As a Chapter officer, Grace won the Regional Scholar Award and was a member of the All-California Academic Team.

Emi: Why did you participate in Beta Theta Omicron?

Grace: The idea of an international honor society that was not solely based on academic achievement sparked my interest. There were a number of activities on campus that were spearheaded or jointly organized by Beta Theta Omicron, such as the AIDS walk, food pantry, and breast cancer walk that I was interested in participating in.
