Allowable Uses of HEERF Institutional Support Funds

- Defray expenses associated with COVID
 - Lost revenue
 - Technology costs associated with a transition to distance education
 - Faculty & staff trainings (Professional Development)
 - Payroll
 - Make additional financial aid grants to students
 - Carry out student support activities authorized by HEA that address needs related to COVID (HEERF II)

CCCCO Immediate Action Budget Package (Mar 25)

- SB 85 Budget Act amendment \$121.1M one-time local assistance funds for immediate COVID-19 response.
- SMCCCD allocations are:
 - Emergency Financial Assistance \$1,048,208
 - Cal-Fresh \$ 38,627
 - Student Retention & Outreach \$249,528
