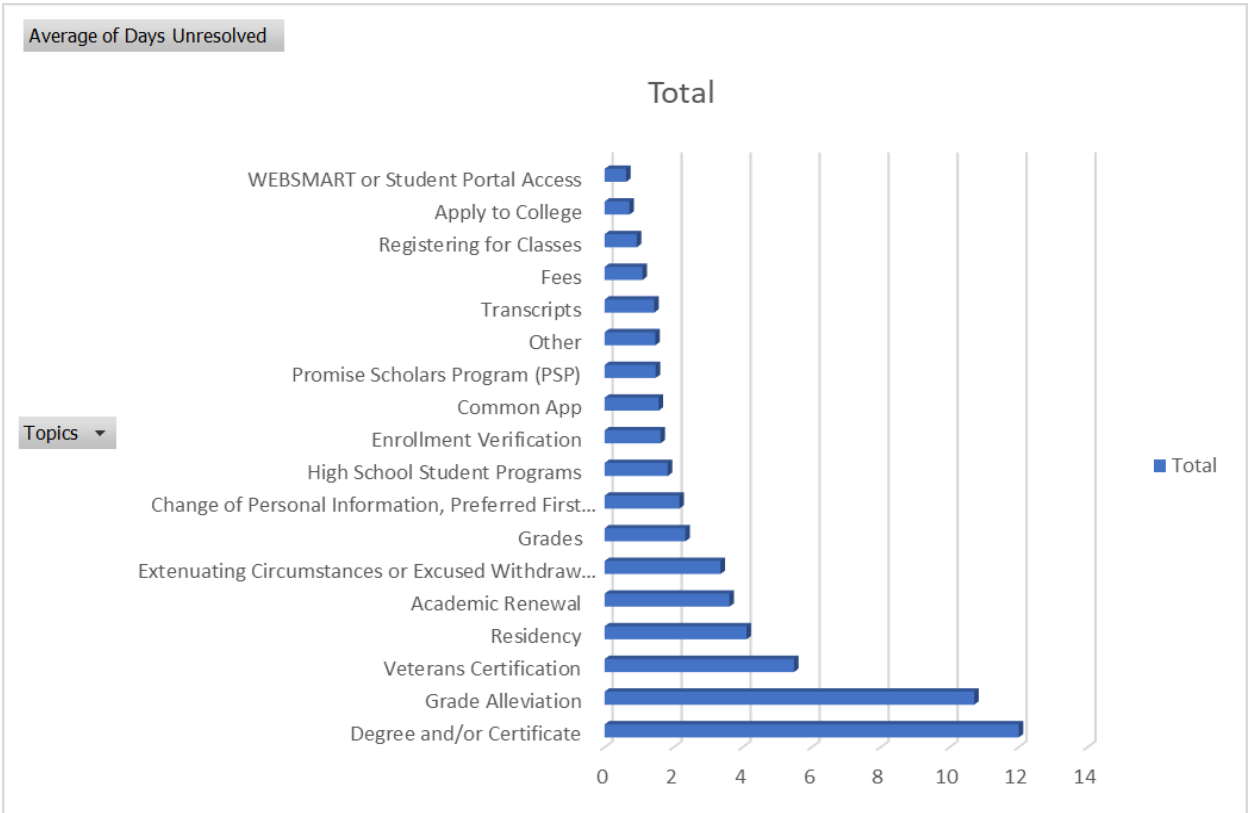
Future Goals

Students are able to successfully navigate and independently resolve challenges as defined by the categories listed in the Admissions & Records Contact Form.

Achievement Highlights

- ✓ Su implementation of the Smartsheet system for student and staff inquiries to provide a timely response and accessibility for everyone.
- ✓ The average A&R response time for student inquiries has been reduced from five days to two days which is a significant improvement from 2022-2023 year.
- ✓ Second phone line was added for the student inquiries in order to address the equity gap in successful student support and enhance service efficiency.
- ✓ A significant time reduction in completion of degree and certificate evaluations which provided students to expedite their employment verification or admission to a higher education.
- ✓ The department migrated to digital copy of the diploma eliminating delays and to increase accessibility.
- ✓ Admissions & Records webpage has been revised and updated to ensure the students have access to accurate information reflecting the legislation and process changes.
- ✓ Admissions & Records forms are being standardized and transitioning to a dynamic, unified online form with automated processes which will reduce confusions and intuitively guides the students to the solution they need.

DANCE COMPREHENSIVE PROGRAM REVIEW 2024-25



DANCE PROGRAM

The Dance program engages movement, community, and artistic expression to enhance well-being and physical vitality. Through training in dance techniques, cultural history, and performance production, students develop teamwork, communication and professionalism.

Graduates pursue careers in performance, choreography, instruction, arts criticism, production, wellness and dance movement therapy. They find opportunities as independent artists, studio owners, therapists and instructors in schools, theaters, studios, film, digital media and private practice. Those seeking to teach are encouraged to earn a credential or advanced degree, supporting the program's commitment to advancing dance research and education.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Collaborations with Professional Performers and Performing Arts Organizations: Dance Production and Choreography courses have supported guest artists to perform and give workshops to our students over the years. Dance students learn from professional Broadway performers, aerial dancers, professional dance company choreographers and dancers and professors from transfer institutions.

New Faces on Campus: Families, future students, donors, and local community members attend our dance show, giving back to our local community and raising awareness about the rich student experience at Skyline College.



AB 928 IMPACTS

Impact on Multiple Disciplines: Excluding lifelong learning and self-development courses may limit educational breadth and student engagement across fields like dance, kinesiology, social sciences, humanities, and health education.

Widening Gaps & Disparities: Removing Area E under AB 928 could worsen health disparities and success gaps for disproportionately impacted students, underscoring the need for equitable access to these courses.

Advocating for Retention: The Dance department supports keeping "Self-Development" courses as an SMCCCD graduation requirement, recognizing their crucial role in personal growth, well-being, and academic success.

PROGRAM STRENGTHS

Commitment to Student Success: The *Dance Program showcases consistent performance and student success rates that exceed college averages*, with initiatives focused on enhancing student learning, such as curriculum expansions to reflect worldwide dance forms with respect, research and rigor.

Equitable Access Success: 5-15% Above College Average for Student Success for Minority Cohorts for In-Person, Hybrid and Synchronous Courses

Resilient Response to Challenges: Despite the obstacles posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Dance department demonstrated resilience and dedication, successfully transitioning activity-based courses back to face-to-face formats, resulting in significantly higher success rates, and greatly expanding our online offerings and resources. Our headcount numbers per section have returned despite ongoing draining shifts in enrollment modality and GE requirements.

Creative and Intentional Focus: When the pandemic shifted courses online, our sister colleges cloned our most popular online courses, diluting our student pool by 80%. In response, we created new and popular GE lecture courses, Roots of Hip Hop Dance and Dances of the World: Cultural Expression in Motion, to align with our community's areas of interest and attract students back to our program.

Continuous Improvement: The Dance program's commitment to continuous improvement is evident through its faculty's professional development activities, assessment practices and forward-thinking approach, positioning it for continued growth and excellence in alignment with district and institutional goals.



FUTURE GOALS

Expand Course Offerings: Regularly offer courses that align with student interests, institutional priorities and our local community. Expanding offerings in high-demand dance styles will increase enrollment and visibility for the program.

Expand Program Focus: Enrollment trends show culturally relevant wellness and self-development courses directly increase enrollment. Studies show that having students on campus and caring for their whole being results in success across their college goals

Construct Campus Fitness Center: Our goal is the successful construction of a campus fitness center, aligning with district and campus values of equity and social justice. Providing access to evidence-based, curriculum-integrated classes will bridge health outcome disparities across social, ethnic, and economic boundaries, ensuring all students benefit from kinesthetic learning.

ESOL COMPREHENSIVE PROGRAM REVIEW 2024-25

- Program Mission: “To empower and transform our global community of nonnative English (ESL) learners.”
- Our three-semester program moves students from low-intermediate to advanced English language proficiency through courses targeting reading, writing, grammar, vocabulary, listening, speaking and pronunciation.

Program Highlights

- Low income students do slightly better in our ESOL courses than they do in classes at the College as a whole. Across the College, low income students had a 72% success rate from Summer of 2018 to Spring of 2023, while low income students in ESOL classes had a 77% success rate during the same time periods.
- ESOL 400 achieved transferable status to the UC and CSU systems; students now get transfer units in humanities.
- We offer classes in evenings & on Saturdays in addition to daytime.
- We have a curriculum focused on social justice.

The ESL Connect office (Building 1, Room 218) helps non-native English speakers apply to college and make use of its resources to achieve their goals.

Goals

- Hire an additional full-time faculty in advance of the impending retirement of a senior faculty member.
- Create a video to better inform students & counselors as to the best way to place into our levels.
- Design & implement a survey for faculty teaching courses popular with ESOL students to see which specific ESOL skills are needed to best succeed in those classes.
- Hold a retreat for faculty to discuss success & teaching strategies.
- Align CORs with the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR) level descriptions.

Challenges

- The demographics of our students are hard to see because they do not fit into the standard census categories. Thus, we lack specific data on certain ethnic & linguistic groups.
- We struggle to support Latino and Arab males, whose success lags behind other groups due to work and family obligations and expectations.
- The Guided Self Placement does not accurately assess reading & other important skills; this creates challenges in finding appropriate classes for students in a timely manner.
- The District has not yet made it possible for us to offer our noncredit courses.

Health Science Comprehensive Program Review 2024-25

Health Science

The Health Science program prepares students for careers and advanced coursework in healthcare, allied health, and public health as well as providing the Skyline community with foundational instruction in personal and community health. Students are able to establish critical frameworks for interrogating and understanding factors influencing personal, community, and environmental health.

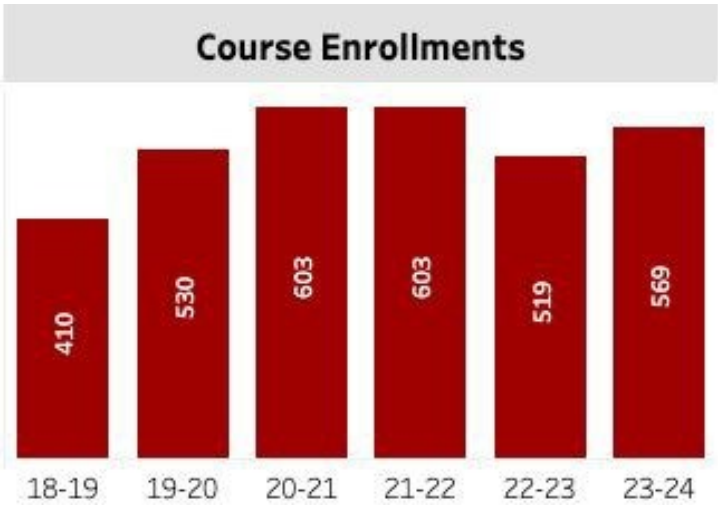

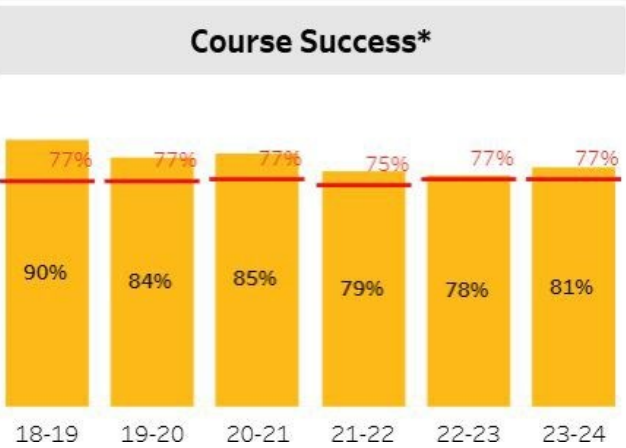
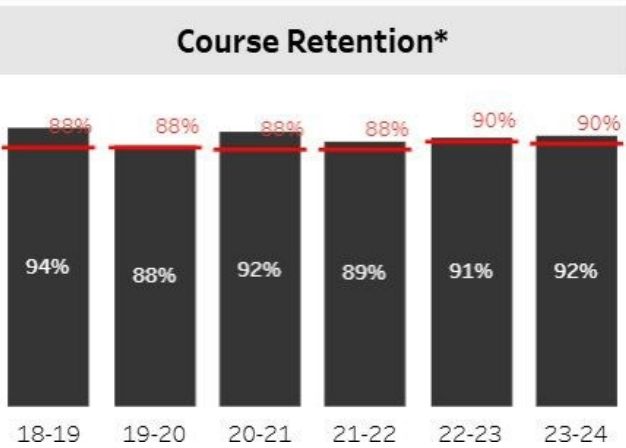


Achievement Highlights

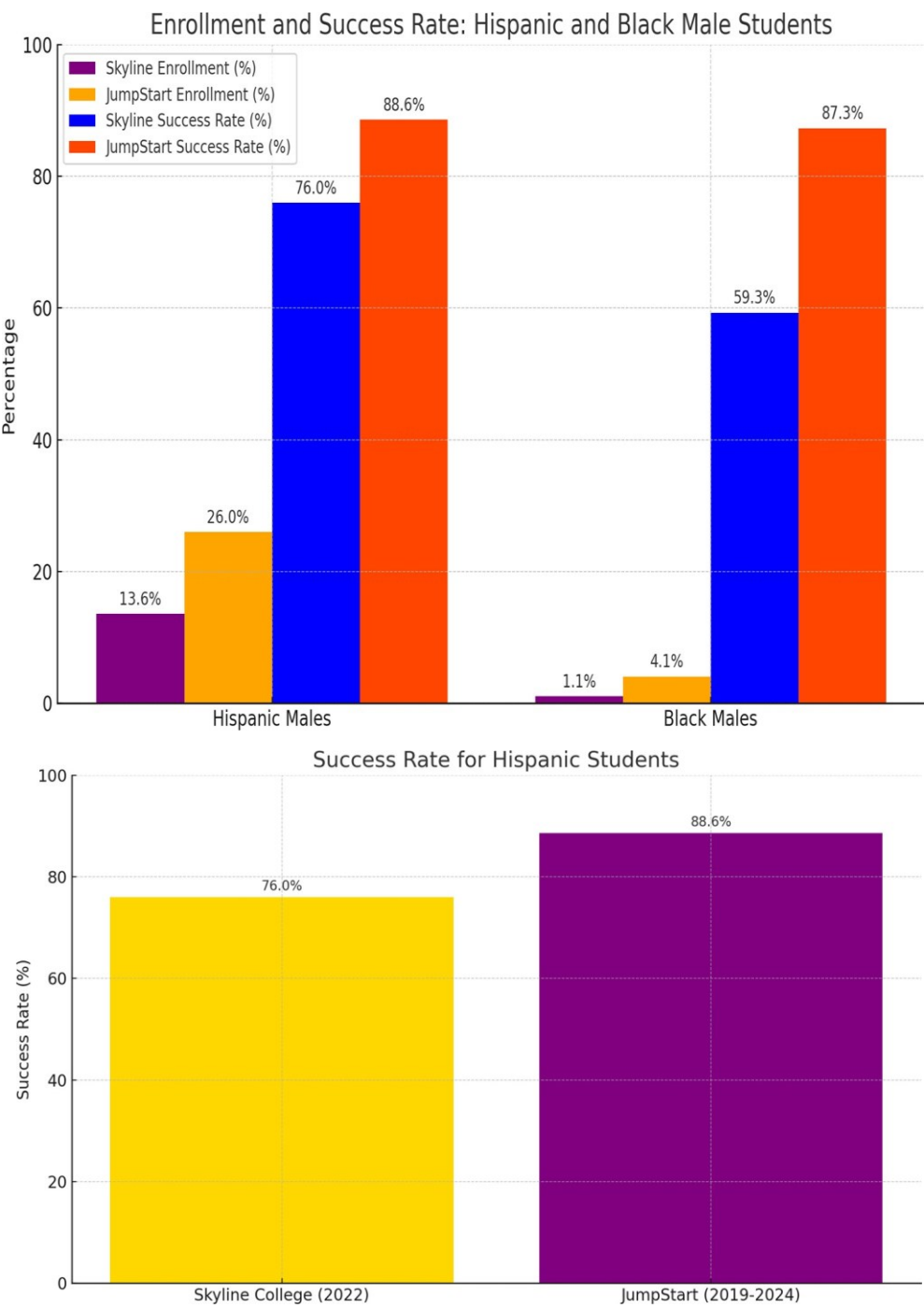
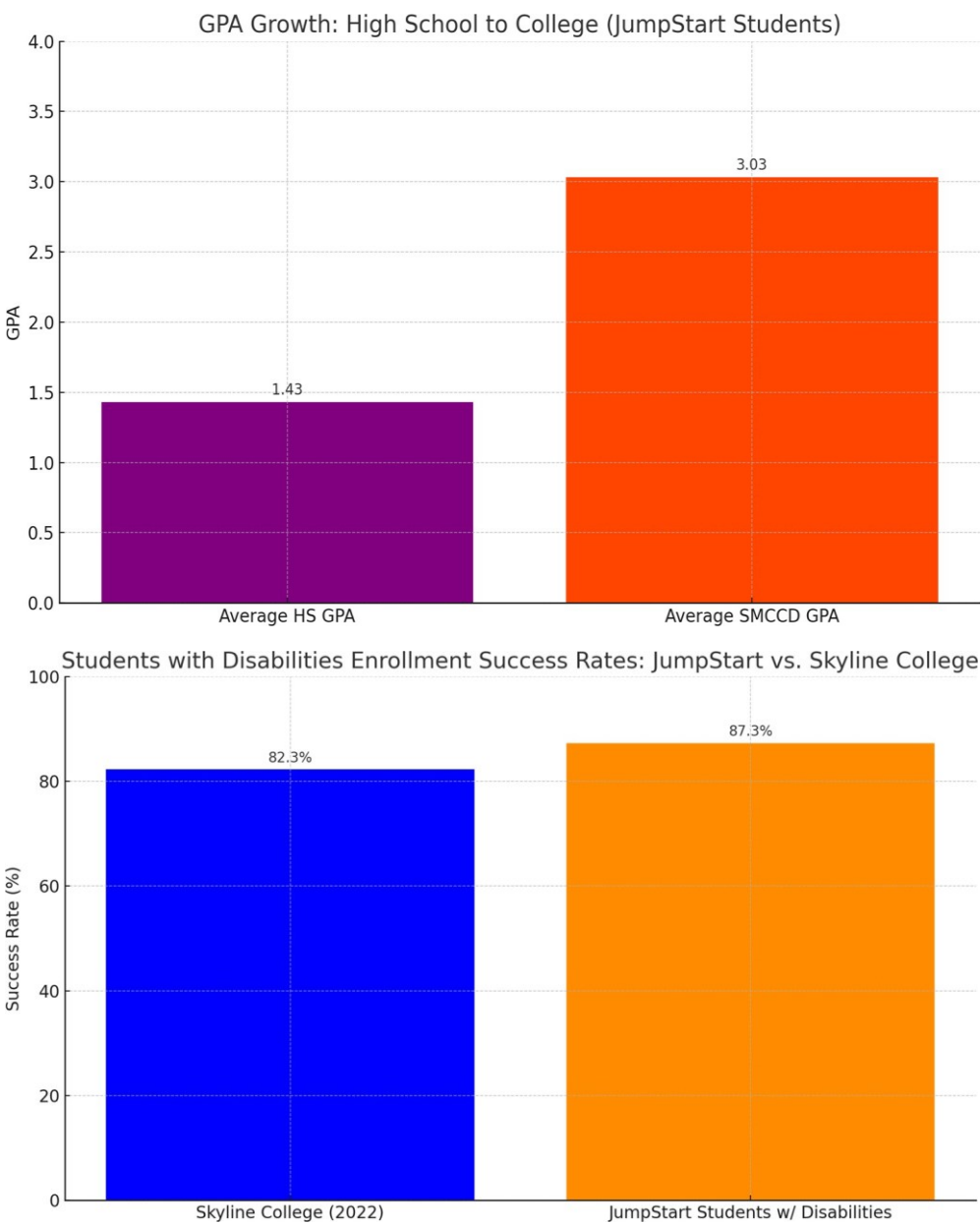

Additional Program Achievements

1. GPA Growth: Students who transitioned from JumpStart to SMCCD improved their GPA from a high school average of 1.43 to a college average of 3.03, representing a 112% increase.
2. Course Success Rate for Students with Disabilities: JumpStart students with disabilities achieved a course success rate of 87.3%, based on the program's overall performance—surpassing Skyline College's 2022 average of 82.3%.
3. Increased Enrollment and Success for Hispanic Students: Hispanic males made up 26% of JumpStart enrollment—nearly double their estimated representation at Skyline College (13.55%)—and achieved a success rate of 88.6%, compared to 76.0% college-wide.
4. Increased Enrollment and Success for Black Male Students: Black males represented 4.1% of JumpStart enrollment, far exceeding their estimated college-wide representation (1.05%), and achieved an estimated success rate of 87.3%, greatly surpassing the Skyline average of 59.3%.

The Skyline College Library serves as an essential academic partner, supporting students and faculty across all disciplines through inclusive programming, curriculum-aligned collections, and robust information literacy instruction. It fosters equitable access to resources—including Zero Textbook Cost (ZTC) materials, technology lending, and digital databases—while promoting critical thinking, civic engagement, and global awareness. As a dynamic hub for learning and community, the library empowers students to thrive academically and personally.

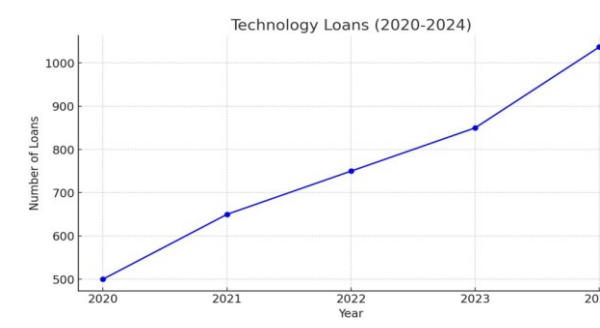
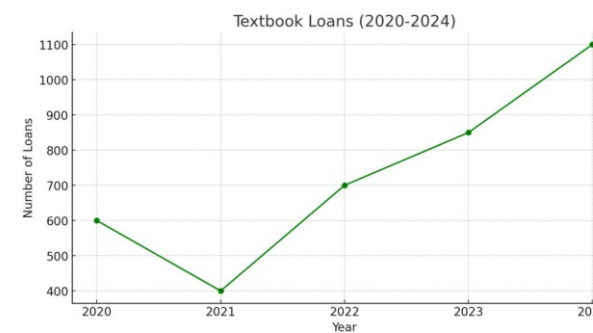
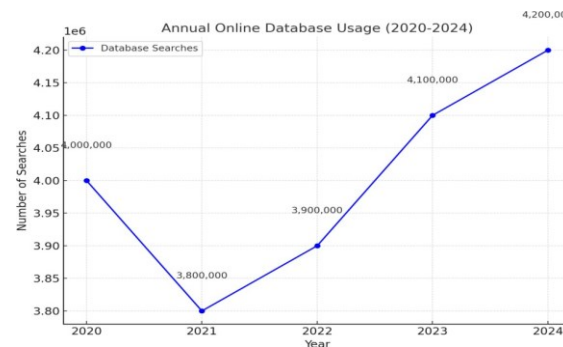
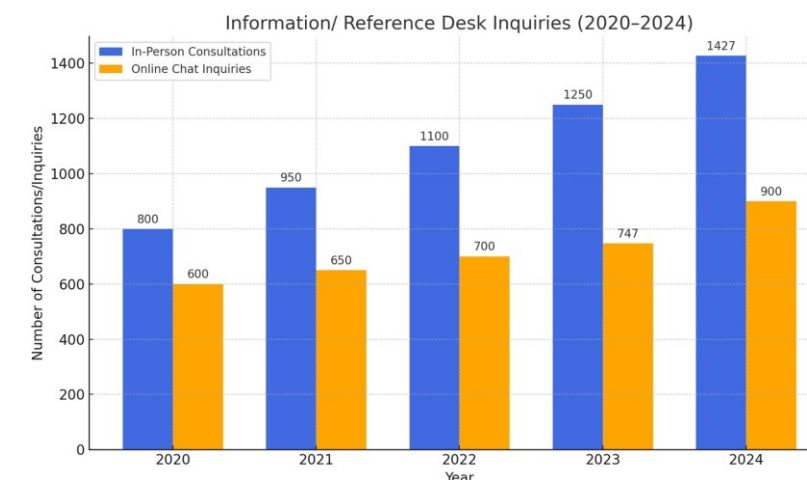


Goals

- **Institutionalize Library Programming**
Institutionalize funding and support for library programs that celebrate diversity, promote civic engagement, and create a sense of belonging on campus.
- **Data Driven Library Service Enhancement/Continuous Improvement**
Implement a comprehensive, privacy-conscious data collection plan to assess user needs, enhance service delivery, and align resources with student and faculty priorities.
- **Align Library Services and Resources with Teaching and Learning Needs**
To support student and faculty success, align library services with curriculum and pedagogy to provide accessible, relevant, and equitable resources for all learning environments.

Library Highlights

- **Information Literacy:** Reached 2,300+ students annually through 70 classroom sessions, online tutorials, and Canvas modules.
- **Wellness Programming:** Served 500+ students annually through events like therapy animals, art activities, and mental health workshops.
- **Civic & Cultural Engagement:** Engaged 200+ students per semester through programs like Banned Books Week, Human Library, film screenings, poetry readings, and voter registration.
- **ZTC/OER:** Saved students \$13.17M; supported 101,000+ students through 148 ZTC projects and widespread OER adoption.
- **Digital Resources:** 122 research guides (1.2M views), 4M+ database searches/year, and 10,361 CDL checkouts expand access to course materials.
- **Course Reserves:** 18% of total circulation; 83% increase in usage over 6 years with ~1,100 checkouts last year.
- **Technology Loans:** 1,037 items available (laptops, hotspots, iPads, calculators); up to 80% checked out at any time.



Additional Significant Information

- **District Collaboration on Information Literacy:** In response to AB928, the Library is collaborating with Cañada College and CSM to embed Information Literacy into general education courses and ensure transfer pathway alignment.
- **ZTC/OER:** While the library has always been an integral part of ZTC/OER, beginning Spring 2025, the Library will take institutional leadership of ZTC/OER efforts, building a cross-functional team to lead, coordinate, and grow the campus-wide initiative to align with EMP and statewide goals.
- **Development of New Program Student Learning Outcomes (PSLOs):** The Library has developed new PSLOs to better reflect its broad impact on student learning, focusing on information literacy, equity and access, global citizenship, and wellness.

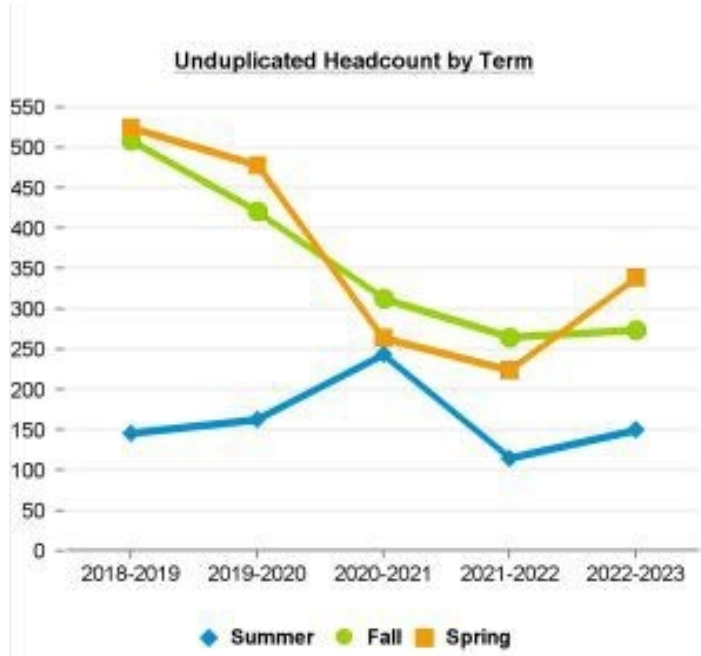

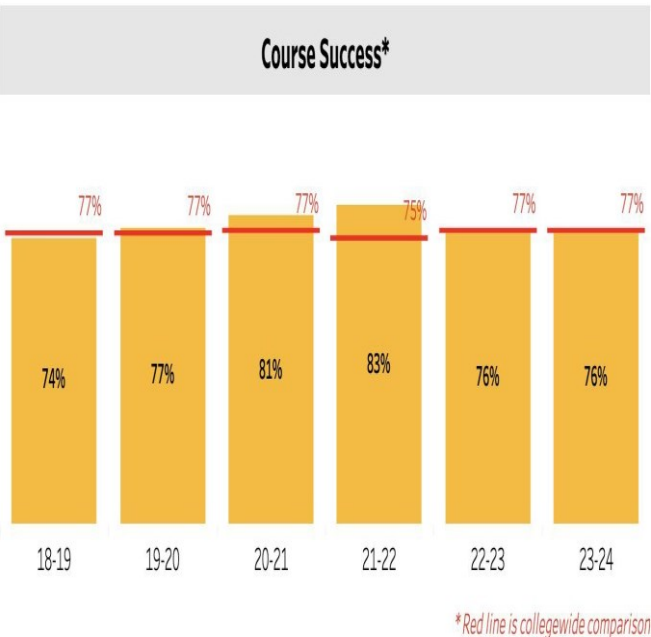
COVID EFFECTS ON ENROLLMENT

Music course enrollments plummeted during COVID, more so than the college average. Enrollments were down by over 50%. Enrollments are now recovering quickly in all modalities, but especially in face-to-face sections, including new course offerings.

TRIO Comprehensive Program Review 2024-25

TRIO

Introduction:

Since 1995, Skyline College's TRIO Student Support Services (SSS) has been funded by the U.S. Department of Education, offering free, comprehensive services designed to promote academic success. TRIO provides support and service to first-generation college students, low-income students, and/or students with physical or learning differences who have an academic need, enabling them to earn a certificate or graduate with an associate degree and transfer to a four-year university. Given the program eligibility, TRIO serves a higher proportion of disproportionately impacted student groups, yet has achieved similar or higher outcomes than the campus.

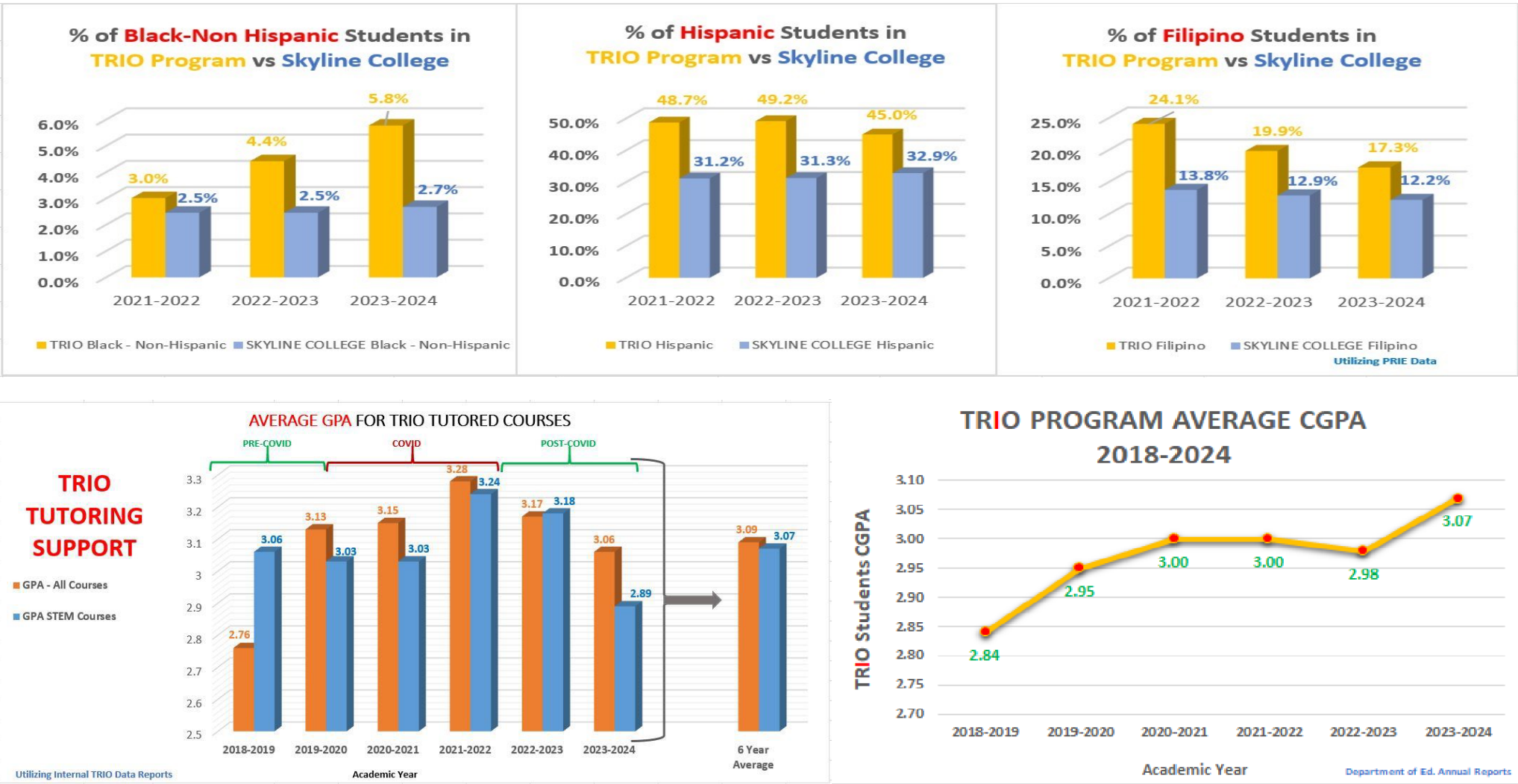

Additional Significant Information

TRIO has accomplished and surpassed all program objectives despite a significant reduction in personnel (loss of TRIO Math and English Coordinators)

- 23-24: Students coded TRIO attended over 2,000 counseling appointments
- 23-24: African American students in TRIO had a 9% higher success rate in courses (77% to 68%)
- 23-24: Filipino students in TRIO had a 9% higher success rate in courses (85% to 76%)
- 23-24: 9% of TRIO students were registered with the EAC, over 5% more than the general student body
- 23-24: 3.3% of TRIO students were Foster Youth, 2.7% more than the general student body
- 63% of all tutoring occurs in STEM courses over the past 6 years
