
Next week the Adewole Project is presenting "Conversation with Author Frank A. Jones, Ph.D."

Professor Tony Jackson, Psychology, delivered the keynote address at the Hayward Unified School District's Adewole Intervention Program student recognition ceremony (for grades 4-12) on April 20. His talk was entitled "The Talented Tenth."

College Council update for meeting of April 25

- 1. **ASSC update:** Luis Padilla and Sylvia Martinez reported on plans for ASSC elections, the May 2 celebration for El Cinco de Mayo, the Earth Day campus cleanup planned for April 30, and their plans to participate in the statewide student government conference.
- Accreditation update: Ray Hernandez reported that there will be an Open Forum to discuss the last draft of the Self Study Report on May 2, 1:30-3:00 in Room 1111.
- **3. Budget update:** Vicki Morrow reported on the college's plans for balancing the budget in the 2007-08 year.
- 4. District Shared Governance Committee (DSGC) update: Luis Padilla and Linda Allen reported on the topics addressed in the most recent meeting, including a review of the district's "functional map", required by the Accrediting Commission. It has been developed collaboratively by the Accreditation Steering Committees of the three colleges and key district staff involved in the various functions. The DSGC also reviewed a minor revision to board rules and regulations and discussed the proposed changes to the student health fee and the parking fees. Cost deficiencies are currently being covered by the general fund. No action was taken.
- **5. Fresh Look Project update:** Vicki Morrow alerted the members to the need to make appointments to the group that will conduct a visioning exercise relative to the website redesign, on May 4.
- **6. Educational and Facilities Master Plan update:** Vicki Morrow reviewed the status of the development of the Request for Proposals for the college's design/build project. That project will involve several new buildings and the parking lots, roadways, entries and landscaping for the college.
- 7. First Year Experience update: Regina Stanback Stroud and Lori Adrian provided an update on the extensive work being done by the First Year Experience group and showed the Council the website where that detailed work is being archived and tracked in preparation for the development of their final report and recommendations to the college.
- **8. Skyline Shines Awards 2007:** The Council will hold a special meeting to conduct the screening of this year's nominees for the Skyline Shines Award to a college employee or group of employees.
- 9. Update from constituent groups on College Hour discussion: This topic was brought forward initially by the ASSC. The Academic Senate and the Classified Council have not been able to discuss it yet, but will do so in advance of the next College Council meeting.
- 10. Health and Safety Committee assessment of designated smoking areas: The committee will be conducting a web-based survey of summer and fall students and for faculty and staff to assess the effectiveness of the designated smoking areas. Ray Hernandez reported that he is considering doing his master's thesis project on the smoking issue. Sylvia Cervantes reported that a new student club has been formed called Smoke Free San Mateo County Advocates.
- 11. Commencement update: Commencement will be held at 5 pm this year for the first time and will be back in our Gymnasium, with the reception afterward in the Student and Community Center.
- 12. Annual Report Draft for 2006-07: Last fall, the first annual report on the work of the College Council was published and this 2005-06 report is archived at http://www.smccd.edu/accounts/skycouncil/home.html. The Council reviewed a draft of the 2006-07 report and agreed that the material from the April and May meetings will be added to it and it will be published electronically in early summer and archived on the website.

TEA TIME WITH THE SLOAC COMMITTEE

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Spring 2007 Draft: Degree Level Student Learning Outcomes

The following draft was generated in concert with the Skyline Curriculum Committee and the Student Learning Outcomes Assessment Cycle (SLOAC) Steering Committee in Fall 2006. Both committees drew from existing Accreditation standards, Title V Requirements for General Education, and the College's current requirements (competency, area requirements, and general education requirements).

Critical Thinking

Students will be able to:

- recognize the value of critical thinking in problem solving across the disciplines and in daily life.
- raise vital questions, formulate responses (or solutions) to problems, evaluate the reasonableness of a solution and provide a justification.
- analyze and compose arguments; assess the validity or strength of an argument using appropriate deductive and inductive techniques.
- think creatively and open mindedly within alternative systems of thought; communicate, either artistically, graphically, symbolically, or verbally, a complete and clear solution to a given problem.
- make effective use of evidence in an argument; evaluate the truth or value of the premises using reliable sources of information.

- demonstrate understanding of diverse disciplinary perspectives and use appropriate inquiry, including the scientific method.
- analyze multiple representations of quantitative information, including graphical, formulaic, numerical, and verbal.

Effective Communication

Students will be able to:

 comprehend, analyze, and respond appropriately to oral, written, and visual information. Students will be able to effectively express ideas through speaking and writing.

Global Citizenship

Students will be able to:

- use knowledge acquired from coursework and campus resources to be ethically responsible world citizens, informed and involved in civic affairs locally and globally.
- develop attitudes central to lifelong learning: openness, flexibility, intellectual curiosity, and a broad perspective that values diversity of thought.
- demonstrate appropriate social skills in group settings, listening and being receptive to others' ideas and feelings, effectively contributing ideas, and demonstrating leadership by motivating others.

Information and Computer Technology Literacy

Students will be able to:

- effectively locate and access information in numerous formats using a variety of appropriate search tools.
- use computer technology to organize, manage, integrate, synthesize, create, and communicate information and ideas in order to solve problems and function effectively in an information society.
- evaluate the relevance, quality, and credibility of a wide variety of information sources using critical thinking and problem solving skills.

Lifelong Wellness

Students will be able to:

 demonstrate an understanding of physical fitness and its role in personal development and lifelong wellness.
