Vision and Mission Renewal

Skyline College is engaged in a renewal of our current vision and mission during this Fall semester. The process was designed to synchronize with the budget and planning cycle and make use of new information that has surfaced from our recent Education Master Plan. The process encompasses a review of the college purpose and an assessment of where the college wants to be in ten years from now. The Institutional Planning Committee (IPC) is leading the process and is facilitating input from all constituency groups as follows:

- 1. The IPC in consultation with the Standard I Accreditation Committee drafted the first revision of the vision and mission statements and created a structure for college-wide input.
- 2. A draft of the revised vision and mission statements is being presented to all constituency groups (i.e., Academic Senate, Classified Senate and Associated Student Council) and college-wide for feedback and input. This email invitation for input is part of that process.
- 3. The IPC will review all feedback and make final adjustments to the vision and mission statements.
- 4. The College Council will review the final revised vision and mission statements and take them to their constituency groups for approval and then the Council will make a final recommendation to the President.
- 5. The President will approve the renewed vision and mission statements and take them to the Board of Trustees for approval.

In order to ensure that everyone who would like to weigh in has the direct opportunity to do so, I am providing the current draft of the new vision and mission statemenst here. **Please provide any feedback to Cathy Hasson by next Friday, November 10.** Here are the current followed by the proposed revisions.

New Security Chief

Jeffrey Hodges comes to Skyline as the new Chief of Security on Monday, November 6, 2006. His long and impressive background in security and law enforcement began when he worked as a security officer at the College of San Mateo while completing two Associate in Science degrees: Administration of Justice and Aeronautics Commercial Pilot Program. Jeff's began his twenty five year law enforcement career with the Alameda County Sherriff's Department in 1980. shortly after he began attending San Jose State University to pursue a Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice. During his career, Jeff received several promotions and worked a number of different assignments: as a Field Training Officer, Internal Affairs Investigative Sergeant, Lieutenant and, prior to his retirement, as a Watch Commander. Jeff's assignments included the courts, jails, headquarters, and patrol. He also spent six years assigned to a special contract in which he provided police services to the Peralta Community College District as a Patrol Sergeant, Administrative Supervisor, and CALEA (Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies) Manager for the unit. He worked closely with the college presidents and coordinated services for the faculty, staff, and students. In addition to having completed the highest levels of Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST), Jeff has also completed an impressive array of specialized training, for example, Standardized Emergency Management System, Eco-Terrorism, Weapons of Mass Destruction, and Anti-Terrorism. He received numerous written commendations during his career with the Alameda County Sherriff's

Department. Jeff brings a wealth of experience and training in providing safety and security services to diverse populations. He is excited about coming home to the college district in which he started his education and career, and looks forward to serving the needs of the Skyline College community.





20 students representing Skyline College presented their original scientific research at the 2006 Annual convention of the Society for the Advancement of Chicanos and Native Americans in Science (SACNAS), October 26-29, 2006 in Tampa. Ten of the students began their in the spring semester in Dr. Christine Case's Biology 230 class including the development of a research inquiry, designing experiments, implementing the experiments, collecting and analyzing data, doing a review of current literature. These same students later enrolled in Biology 690 and submitted abstracts which were evaluated and accepted for publication and presentation at the SACNAS convention.

A second group of students conducted research at Skyline in a five week residential summer program in Marine Biology funded by the National Science Foundation. MESA Director Tiffany Reardon and Biology Instructors Shari Bookstaff and Kim Touneh worked with nine MESA students from both Northern and Southern California on the following projects:

- Correlation of Temperature on the Population of Leopard Shark in the San Francisco Bay Estuary from 1993-2001. Martha Gallegos & Javier Solis.
- Comparison of Fledging Success Rates Among Brandt's Cormorants in Devil's Slida, Berizohar Padilla & Aurora Mojica.

• Relationship between Temperatures Changes and Population of the California Halibut in the San Francisco Bay from 1993-2001, Rafael Montanez, Ivania Enriquez, Martha Acosta.

Certainly one of the highlights of the conference was Nasim Naderseresht 's poster *Detecting Planetary Debris Disk Around Young Stars Using Adaptive Optics* winning in the Physics and Astronomy Category. Nasim conducted her research with the Center for Adaptive Optics at UC Berkeley.

Puente/ASTEP/Kababayan Career Mixer



On the evening of Friday, October 27, approximately seventy students descended upon Skyline's cafeteria to participate in the first ever Career Mixer that was hosted and organized by P.A.K.--the Puente, ASTEP, and Kababayan learning communities. Students participated in two intimate workshops with the presenters, and later received information about how to seek internships. Twenty four presenters, many of whom are of color, described their careers, the benefits and drawbacks of their careers, and tips on pursuing such careers, with room for Q & A. They represented a wide range: Business, Health, Law, Social Work, Education, Engineering/CIS, Biology, Broadcasting. Students emerged from the evening eager to put into practice the tips that many noted on their evaluation form: the importance of networking, securing internships, and following their passions as they choose a career. They gave high marks to the presentations and especially enjoyed the informal atmosphere that gave them an opportunity to talk to the presenters. As for criticisms, many remarked that they would have liked the workshops to be longer and that more students on campus had an opportunity to attend. Kudos to the P.A.K. students who helped to facilitate the workshops and generally make the event a success, to ASSC President Luis Padilla for M.C.ing the evening, to Dean of Counseling Jennifer Hughes for welcoming our presenters and facilitators, as well as to Puente's Jacquie Escobar and Karen Wong, ASTEP's Pat Deamer and Lucia Lachmayr, and Kababayan's Liza Erpelo and Nate Nevado for organizing the evening. Especial thanks to our presenters from the community and to the ASSC and the Career Center for providing funding.
