Kaugnayan means connection

The Kababayan Program presented an afternoon of Philippine folk dance and music featuring the Kababayan Dance Troupe of Skyline College and Barangay Dance Company, under the direction of artistic and dance directors Bonifacio Valera and Vickie Hafalia, at the Skyline Theater on October 24. Appropriately entitled "Kaugnayan," which means connection or unity, the show reflected the interrelationship between the participants of this event, coming together to achieve the common goal of preserving and promoting the Filipino cultural heritage through the arts, folk dancing, and music. The two groups presented various regional dances of the Philippines, from the dances of the lowland Christian groups to the dances of the Cordillera and Mindanao tribes. They were joined by the St. Thomas More 8 pm Choir who performed popular songs and tribal chants from the Philippines. Tenor Leon Palad and soprano Tracy Sarmiento performed *kundimans* or classic songs of the Philippines. This is the first full folk dance concert co-produced by the Kababayan Program and was sponsored in part by the President's Innovation Fund.



MESA students give presentations at professional conference

Earlier this month students from Skyline's MESA Program attended the 2009 Annual SACNAS conference in Dallas, Texas. SACNAS is the Society for the Advancement of Chicanos and Native Americans in Science. Students, staff and faculty from many schools across the country were represented at this meeting. Skyline MESA students presented their original research alongside 700 upper division students from four-year schools. Our students had the chance to meet peers and future colleagues from universities and colleges from the East Coast to the West Coast, and in between. Skyline MESA students also participated in professional development talks, networking workshops and research presentations. The scientific research completed by Skyline students was made possible by funding from Skyline MESA, and the seemingly unending volunteered support of Biology Lab Technician Pat Carter, Biology Professor Nick Kapp, and Biology Professor Christine Case. The students spent their summer doing research in Case's and Kapp's labs. College Council update

- 1. ACCJC October 2009 Follow up Report:** Vicki reported that the college's Follow-up Report had been approved by the Council via email vote, approved by the Board, submitted to the Accrediting Commission and is scheduled for action at their January meeting. The college's Midterm Report is due next fall, at the three year point since the team visit. She noted that the team's recommendations to the college have all been addressed and the college's own planning agendas are well under way.
- 2. District Shared Governance Committee update:** The Council reviewed the feedback to date from the constituency groups concerning the proposed revisions to the Board's Rules and Regulations. Fermin Irigoyen, Vice President of the Academic Senate, described the Academic Senate discussion on a few of the items and Rakefet Avramovitz, President of the Classified Council reported that classified staff are submitting their feedback to Linda Allen, their representative to the District Shared Governance Council.
- 3. Budget update:** Fermin Irigoyen, member of the Program Improvement and Viability (PIV) Committee, provided an update on their work. He indicated that Regina Stanback Stroud, Vice President of Instruction, would be meeting with Harry Joel, Vice Chancellor of Human Resources, to discuss HR issues (Vicki noted that this meeting has now taken place) and then Harry Joel will brief the board. Regina will talk next week to faculty whose programs are going into the PIV

process and Harry will be present as well to answer questions from the faculty. There are four programs identified: two are low load and two are non-degree requirements or major requirements. Harry will present the retirement incentive, the faculty's FSAs and their bumping rights. Then the PIV Committee will start working on the programs. The programs will be ranked and the committee will present a recommendation to the President relative to the ranking. The College Budget Committee will focus upon the financial implications of the prospective program cuts and also make a recommendation to the President, who will make the final decision. The PIV Committee also discussed the reduction of 85 sections for spring 2010. This equates to 200 FTES, which represents 14.3 full-time equivalent faculty (FTEF). One full-time faculty member is retiring. It is possible that some of the people in the programs going through the PIV process would take advantage of the retirement incentives.

4. Next meeting: November 17

College Budget Committee (CBC) update

The College Budget Committee met on October 29, 2009 with Academic Senate President Ray Hernandez and Director of Business Services Eloisa Briones serving as Co-Chairs.

1. **District Committee on Budget & Finance (DCBF) report:** Professor Linda Whitten reported back from the Oct. 20 DCBF meeting. California's actual revenues are lagging so the state might be looking at another \$2 billion shortage in projected revenues. SMCCCD budgeted for 2.5% midyear cuts so the district should be able to weather further cuts up to this amount. The district is at the cusp of becoming basic aid. As soon as that happens, the district will be relying on enrollment fees and property taxes instead of state apportionment. SMCCCD will receive one-time federal stimulus funding (ARRA funds) which, although unrestricted, can be used to backfill categorical cuts. Representatives from each of the campuses and the district office described the cuts they have identified at their respective sites. Everyone agreed that next year's cuts will be extremely difficult and that there are no easy cuts left to make.
2. **Reduction Strategies--review and discussion:** The committee continued its discussion of the Fund 1 Budget Reduction Strategies for FY 2010-11. Dean Margie Meadows and Judy Heldberg, Child Center coordinator, presented additional information regarding the Children's Center operations. Dean Joe Morello spoke about the strategy to reduce summer offerings by 50%. The committee voted to include the reduction of summer offerings by 50% and the reduction of summer hourly counseling on its list of proposed budget reductions. CBC will continue its evaluation of the remaining strategies at its next meeting with the goal of completing its list of strategies that will be recommended to the President to meet the college's budget reduction target at the 10% level.
3. **Next meeting:** The Committee agreed to hold additional meetings to continue its budget discussions. CBC will meet again next week on Thursday, Nov. 5.
