President's Report to the Board of Trustees

The board honored Pat Carter and the other three classified staff nominated by the colleges and
the district office for the state Board of Governors (BOG) Classified Employee of the Year
Award. They named the person they selected to be their nominee to the state board: Patricia
Carter! The BOG will announce their choices at the early May meeting. Please join me in

- Along with the chancellor and the other two college presidents, I presented the Skyline budget reduction proposal for the year 2010-11 and the board approved the proposal. As you know from an earlier edition of this newsletter, the proposal was the same one the CBC recommended, with one change. The board indicated that they were willing for some non-general fund money to be used to provide the subsidy to the Children's Center. That money will come from Redevelopment Agency funds which the district receives and has usually dedicated to the repair and upgrading of outdoor facilities. You may recall that our athletic fields were renovated by means of that funding source. As a result, the amount we would have spent on the CDC can be redirected temporarily to ease our cut to the summer schedule from 50 percent down to a 30 percent reduction.
- The board moved forward with an plan to put a proposal for a **parcel tax** on the June ballot. It would be for \$34 per year for four years, exempting seniors. There will be a public hearing at the board meeting on March 10.

Flex Days coming March 10-12

You heard it from Nina Floro earlier this week; here is her latest:

Though there will be quite a variety of workshops available during our March Flex Days, we will offer workshops under 3 primary strands—teaching strategies, student services/success, and employee wellness. Teaching strategies workshops will include alternative modes of assessment, first day practices, self assessment, and teaching/learning styles. Workshops on yoga/meditation, emergency preparedness, and foot are among those that will be offered as part of the employee wellness strand. Also, the area of student success will feature workshops about the new Sparkpoint Center, other student services areas, and autism/aspergers, among others. There are other workshops not yet listed among these, and people will, of course, have the usual option of engaging in SLOAC workshops/assessments. Added to these sessions, PEDAC and SLOAC will once again welcome all Skyline employees to the first day of Flex (Wednesday, 3/10) by hosting a gourmet lunch at noon, catered by Tiffany Bloom Caterers. The lunch will include both meat and vegetarian option gourmet sandwiches, pasta/fruit/caesar salads, as well as cookies for dessert.

Campus power to be shut down April 3-11 for upgrading

I sent out a college wide message earlier this week, but I think this is a message that bears repeating, so here goes again:

As you may have heard, the college's electrical power grid is about to be upgraded in collaboration with Pacific Gas and Electric. The work will take place during the college during spring break, April 3-11, because that worked best for the college and for PG&E. There are fewer

classes held during that week, and faculty and students generally are not on campus. We know that many of the classified employees may have to work, and we will relocate staff to either CSM or the District Office for the Monday-Friday period. No one will be permitted to work in offices on the Skyline main campus, nor Loma Chica and Pac Heights. If any classified staff would rather take vacation and/or compensatory time off, it would help minimize disruption of work and we encourage you to do so.

In an effort to plan for the electrical shutdown, we would appreciate it if all classified staff would **let your supervisor know by March 5** what your plans are for work during the Monday-Friday period of April 5-9 so that we can plan for alternate work locations.

Thanks in advance for your understanding and cooperation.

There are now 112 California Community Colleges

The Chancellor's Office for the California Community Colleges has announced that two additional colleges have now joined the system. Formerly campuses of Riverside City College, Norco and Moreno Valley are now separately accredited as Norco College and Moreno Valley College. So the California Community Colleges now include **112 colleges serving 2.9 million students.**

Skyline Financial Aid Office presents at Cash for College Events

Skyline's Financial Aid Office presented at the Cash for College Events at Jefferson High School on February 2 and South San Francisco High School on February 20. Over 150 students and their parents attended the events. They were sponsored by the California Student Aid Commission, the Office of Assembly Member Jerry Hill, the South San Francisco Unified School District and the Jefferson Union High School District. The workshops were free and open to the public and offered students and parents hands-on financial aid assistance, including help to complete the financial aid forms necessary to apply for Cal Grants. High school seniors who attended a workshop and who apply for a Cal Grant by the March 2 deadline can qualify for an extra \$1,000 scholarship to be used at a qualifying institution next fall. Thank you to Maria Escobar, Director of Financial Aid, for conducting the Spanish workshop at Jefferson High School and to Jocelyn Vila, Program Services Coordinator, for coordinating and presenting at both events. Also, thank you to Financial Aid Campus Ambassadors, Jorge Murillo and Stephanie Nale. Jorge and Stephanie did an exceptional job in preparing the necessary materials and

College Council update

The College Council met on Wednesday, February 24. A summary of the meeting is provided below. The previous minutes are archived at

- 1. District Shared Governance Committee (DSGC) update: Ray Hernandez, Academic Senate President, provided an update on the DSGC discussions of the review of the district's resources allocation model which is under way and on the process being used for the regular review the "delineation of functions" document required by the accrediting commission.
- 2. Budget update: Vicki Morrow, President, indicated that the board of trustees would be taking action February 24 on the budget reduction proposals submitted by the chancellor and the three college presidents. (See above for the report on that action.)
- 3. Accreditation: Ray Hernandez described the proposed process for preparation of the Midterm Report due to the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges in October. The College Council approved the timeline and approach.
- 4. Haiti Now Task Force update: Rakefet Avramovitz, Classified Council President, reported on the work of the task force, a group formed by the classified staff, the faculty, the students and the administration, to raise funds for Haiti relief. She described plans being made for a fundraising event to be held on Saturday, March 13, in the Theater. It will include a concert which will be sponsored by the Associated Students. She also indicated that there may be a panel on Haitian history presented on March 9.
- 5. ASSC Teach in: The council discussed the teach-in panels on the community college budget crisis which had been presented earlier in the day and commented on the high quality of the presentations. The group also discussed ways to improve dissemination of information to students.
- 6. Next meeting: March 24.

College Budget Committee (CBC) update

The College Budget Committee met on Thursday, February 25, co-chaired by Director of Business Services Eloisa Briones and Academic Senate President Raymond Hernandez. A summary of the meeting is provided below. Previous minutes are archived at

- 1. District Committee on Budget and Finance (DCBF) Report: Barbara Lamson gave the CBC a thorough report on the two DCBF meetings that were held since CBC met on January 28. At the Feb. 2nd meeting, Chief Financial Officer Kathy Blackwood gave DCBF a budget update similar to the one she did at CBC's January 28 meeting. Barbara reported the Feb. 16th meeting discussions around the review of the resource allocation model to assess its effectiveness and determine ways to improve it. Similar discussions will be held at Chancellor's Council and the District Strategic Planning Committee. Some of the resource allocation line items that the district committee will be analyzing include the division of FTES goals among the colleges, dollar cost per FTES (Full Time Equivalent Students) and FTE (Full-time Equivalent Employee), and funding high cost programs. Some committee members have suggested that a provision be made in the resource allocation to support categoricals, especially because of the drastic cuts to funding these programs. Kathy Blackwood also advised the committee of the plan to distribute costs to the sites, such as benefits and utilities, which are currently carried under Central Services, to better depict the total cost of operations of each site.
- 2. Report on February 24th Board Meeting: President Vicki Morrow had earlier reported that she accepted CBC's budget reductions recommendation for 2010-11 and presented this to the board during its retreat. The board had reservations about the size of the recommended cuts to summer and the non-inclusion of the elimination of the Child Care Center in the list of proposed reduction strategies. In the end, district staff recommended shifting the district's cost of subsidizing Skyline CDC's employee benefits from the general unrestricted fund to redevelopment funds since these can be used for community-based functions. This will allow Skyline to keep the CDC open for the next two years and give the college time to turn the CDC into a self-sufficient operation. If it is not viable by then, the Center will be closed. This amendment resulted in a positive change to Skyline's reduction strategies in that the college will be able to reduce summer offerings by 30%, instead of 50%. At the Feb. 24th meeting, the board accepted Skyline's recommended budget reduction strategies, along with the district office, CSM and Canada.
- **3. Productivity Report:** Skyline has surpassed its 2009-10 FTES goals with a phenomenal load of 643 for the year. Spring 2010 FTES is up 6%, with 10% fewer sections compared to spring 2009. Spring load is up to 652. Unfunded FTES for this year is estimated at 624.
