The campus has seen big changes over the summer

Those of you who have been away for the summer will see some dramatic changes when you return. The central quad areas, walkways and stairs will be largely in place. he redesigned parking will be in service, increasing the number of spaces just when we need them most. The walls of the new Auto Tech building are starting to take shape, and new Building 4 is also progressing visibly. As I mentioned last spring, the landscaping will follow in the fall, along with the fountain in the main quad and the new gateway monument signs at both road entrances to the college. In addition, our new Smoke Free Campus policy takes effect this fall, and you will see ten designated smoking areas distributed around the perimeter of the campus at the inner edges of the parking lots. How will it look when it is all finished? Here are a couple of glimpses. In this first artist's rendering you can see the view from the central quad toward Building 8, with the amphitheater on the left and then the fountain. The amphitheater is installed; the fountain will come this fall. The second one is an aerial view of the same part of the campus, and includes some of the quad between buildings 1 and 2. The paving will all be in come Monday, though the landscaping will await the fall.





Beyond Economic Self-Sufficiency Tools (BESST) Program comes to Skyline

In collaboration with the San Mateo County Human Services Agency, Skyline College will launch a new program this fall to serve students who qualify for supplemental nutrition assistance. Students can receive employment training by enrolling in career technical education courses and programs. BESST will connect qualified students to food assistance, fee waivers, money for books, transportation assistance and more. The program draws upon federal funding, and has the potential to bring additional resources to the college while not creating additional costs to be borne by the college. Skyline is also participating in a pilot project--the FSET (Food Stamp Employment and Training) Expansion Initiative, a project of the Insight Center for Community Economic Development, which is leading the California effort to design and disseminate the FSET model (also known as the Cal Success model). The pilot project also includes Foothill/DeAnza and Cabrillo College. This program is a critical component of our efforts to support students in improving their economic conditions; the services are bundled, connected to public benefits, and integrated with workforce preparation/career technical education programs and services. Though we expect to start off serving a modest number of students, as the program grows and we are successful in helping students access their public benefits, we anticipate serving hundreds of students. Thanks to Regina Stanback Stroud for her leadership in identifying this excellent program and working with the county to bring it to the college. 
Skyline attends UMOJA Summer Retreat

- Pamela Rios –Case Lab, Skyline College. "Investigation of antibacterial activity of the American cockroach (*Periplaneta americana*)."
