Executive Summary



Short Summary of Findings

The Cosmetology department continues to keep with the mission and goals of the San Mateo Community College District by responding to the needs of the community from which our students emerge. Learner-centered education in a learner-centered environment continues to be the goal of the department. Training continues to be employment-oriented, current and appropriate for the diverse group of students enrolled in the program. After completion of the specific courses (cosmetology – 1600 hours; and esthetics – 600 hours) students are prepared for examination by the Board of Barbering and Cosmetology with a 85-95 percent passing rate. The cosmetology courses at Skyline serve the community by offering day and evening classes. The program continues to display outstanding student success and excellent retention rates over the past twenty-five years.

Three Strengths of the Program

- One of the department's largest strengths is its retention statistics that continues from year to year. Courses are based on student needs as well as the needs of the beauty industry. The department's ongoing goal is to provide all facets of training, both theoretical and practical to ensure success of the students who finish the program.
- We continue to enjoy continuous support for our programs through our unique advisory board who are selected from the beauty industry in the areas of owning and/or managing their own salons. The board members continue to supply the cosmetology students with educational expertise, donated supplies and most importantly job opportunities within their businesses.
- The Skyline instructors are the highest ranking employees of all the surrounding colleges and private beauty schools. Instructors continue to teach students through a well-balanced educational program. All instructors consistently attend outside classes, seminars and trade shows to keep current with rapidly changing trends in the beauty industry.

Three Suggestions for Improvement

- The impending move to building 4 – with high- tech, "smart" classrooms will alleviate the disastrous conditions of our existing classrooms at Pacific Heights. We have endured over the past few years deplorable and unacceptable conditions in the "swing space" of Pacific Heights. There are continuing safety issues relating to the health of staff and students. Leaking roofs and moldy conditions exist although many efforts have been made by maintenance staff on campus to alleviate the problems. The department is scheduled to move prior to summer classes and the existing problems will continue until the move happens.
- Cosmetology Department has undergone a tremendous loss of staff over the past several years with replacement in the form of temporary, short-term employees. There are a number of health issues that continue to hamper the ability of staff to teach at their full capacity. Without consistent and healthy aides to assist in monitoring and interacting with students, the risk of injury and unlearned subjects is extremely high. Instructors are overloaded with extra teaching assignments because of lack of adequate personnel to take on the extra classes that need to be added. Additional faculty and staff are needed to meet the growing needs of the growing cosmetology program.

SKYLINE COLLEGE PROGRAM REVIEW SELF STUDY

PART A: Mission Effectiveness

Overview

1. *State the goals/ focus of this program and how the program contributes to the mission and priorities of the College and District.*

Cosmetology department continues to keep with the mission and goals of the San Mateo Community College District by responding to the needs of the community from which our students emerge from. We continue to provide a learner-centered environment that enables our students to realize their individual potentials. Students are prepared for professional careers in the field of cosmetology through the California Board of Barbering and Cosmetology licensing department. Students continue to be trained to demonstrate skill mastery in cosmetology related activities and are taught to demonstrate analytical thinking in all pertinent classes in the program. Additional courses are offered for instructor preparation, introduction to cosmetology, esthetician training, advanced cosmetology concepts, brush-up classes, and Spa technician training. Transfer options are available with an Associate in Science Degree with cosmetology major upon completion of the program.

2. *Discuss how this program coordinates, impacts, and/or interacts with other programs in the College.*

Cosmetology students participate in college activities through its 100% club membership while fund-raising for specific outside training activities. They provide make-up and hair designs working with student production teams for Skyline, CSM and Canada College fashion departments. Services are provided to the parents of the Child Development Center. Students interact with city of South San Francisco, the local fire and police departments and various feeder high schools in the area. Cosmetology students participate in a number of campus events such as providing hand massages for the annual health fair on campus. A large number of career workshops are provided which bring community businesses onto the campus to create job opportunities for cosmetology students.

3. *Explain how this program meets the needs of our diverse community.*

Skyline cosmetology places no restrictions in enrollment that would negate any student from being a part of our diverse and culturally-rich population. We are totally committed to providing quality education for all students regardless of level of academic preparation, socio-economic status, cultural, religious or ethnic background or disability. Students serve clients in the salon from an equally diverse community as a regular key portion of their training. The program continues to display outstanding student success and retention rates as well as Board of Barbering and Cosmetology licenses obtained by cosmetology and esthetician students.

4. *If the program has completed a previous self-study, evaluate the progress made toward previous goals.*

Cosmetology goals continue to be student centered. Our most important factor continues to be success and well-being of our cosmetology students. Training continues to be current and appropriate for the diverse group of students attending our day and evening programs.

During the spring 2005 semester prior to submitting the self-study and program review, the cosmetology department was presented with two options: (1) Swing to Pacific Heights building and move from there back to a "remodeled, retrofitted" space in building 8 with no chance for increased space or future expansion; or (2) swing to Pacific Heights with an opportunity for a brand new facility built with money from a bond supplemented by college money. Choice (2) was chosen, and endured many safety and health issues for the last five (5) years at Pacific Heights. The Pacific Heights "swing space" did not meet the needs of our department and the upcoming move to a new facility in the brand new building will be extremely welcomed by students, staff and clients.

PART B: Student Learning Programs and Services

Overview

1. If the program utilizes advisory boards and/or professional organizations, describe their roles.

The cosmetology department continues to enjoy a unique relationship with its advisory board members who have been carefully chosen from the industry itself. They regularly interact with student body in providing them with rich expertise garnered from their years of experience in the field. They continue to share knowledge and techniques of the trade to students while providing staff with guidance on cutting edge technology in the field, identifying future trends and evaluating present trends taught to students. The advisory board is key in keeping the staff abreast of rapid changes in the field of cosmetology. The board members are a viable strong force for our program. Graduating students are constantly sought out by board members to fill positions within their salons.

Curriculum

1. Describe how the courses offered in the program meet the needs of the discipline(s) and the students. (This may be answered through descriptive narrative evaluation or quantitative research).

Re-did curriculum to meet needs of students. Freshman section now 16 weeks. Application of intense subject matter needed more practice time. Students were not ready for client base.

2. State how the program has remained current in the discipline(s).

Starting apprenticeship program with salon owners for future interaction employment needs of student environment. Added 6 hours option for students that need to go to work earlier; take care of children; self study time; homework time; catch-up on extra curriculum stuff; club duties; commuting issues - Bart, driving from San Jose, El Cerrito, Oakland, etc.

3. If the student population has changed, state how the program is addressing these changes.

Skyline cosmetology student population remains the same. The diversity mix is pretty constant.

4. All courses in this program should be reviewed for currency and modified every six years. If this has not occurred, please list the courses and explain.

Our courses are uniquely geared toward the requirements of the California Board of Barbering and Cosmetology so that students become licensed cosmetologists and estheticians. Mandatory requirements for becoming licensed are satisfactorily met by cosmetology applicants as reflected in the continuous rate of success in passing the exams given by the Board.

5. *If external accreditation or certification is required, please state the certifying agency and status of the program.*

The Board of Barbering & Cosmetology of the Department of Consumer Affairs regulate the professions of barbering, cosmetology (including skin & nail care) and electrology in California. Anyone who provides the following services for compensation must be licensed by the Board: hairdressing and styling, haircutting, manicuring, removing unwanted hair, skin care, or applying cosmetics. In order to qualify to take the examination, individuals must complete 1600 hours (cosmetology) or 600 hours (esthetician) of course work and practical training.

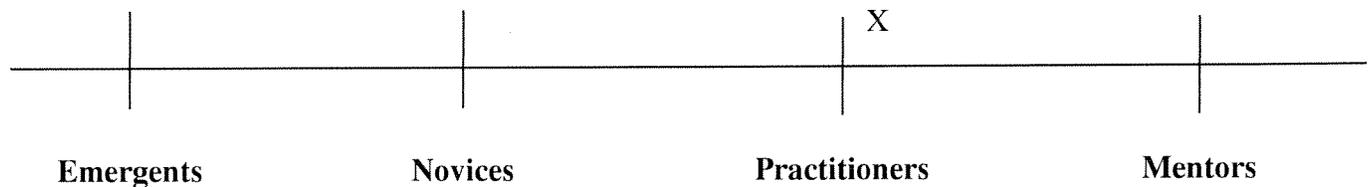
Skyline cosmetology students consistently pass these rigorous exams at a rate of better than 85 percent.

Our passing scores for Board of Barbering & Cosmetology have dropped 10% (see attachment 2).

3. *What additional resources are needed to implement the plan?*

We need additional instructors to provide students extra review prior to going for licensing.

PART C: Resources

Faculty and Staff

- 1. List major development activities completed by faculty and staff in this program in the last six years and state what development is needed or proposed by faculty in this program.*

Skyline Cosmetology instructors continue to actively participate in outreach activities involving senior centers and feeder high schools. In addition, instructors participate in many outreach activities at career day events in high schools, on campus and become involved in other events outlining the importance of pursuing a career as well as having the opportunity to matriculate onto a 4-year college. The cosmetology program offers other programs such as the Spa Technician classes, wellness courses, advanced cosmetology courses geared toward updating and expanding the knowledge and skills of licensed cosmetologists and students.

Skyline Cosmetology students regularly enter and win competitions at trade shows and within the last six (6) years many trophies were won in the area of make-up, hair styling and nail art.

Instructors attend many trade and technical shows held throughout California and as far away as Nevada on a continuing basis.

- 2. Describe the orientation process for new faculty and staff (include student workers such as tutors and aides).*

Training for new faculty and staff has been sporadic or minimally performed. Instructors are encouraged to attend the ongoing instructor preparation classes where department teaching methods are routinely reviewed. In addition, the instructor preparation classes are not offered at any other institution of cosmetology at this time.

- 3. If recruitment of new and/or diverse faculty is needed, suggest recruitment techniques.*

The cosmetology program is sorely in need of new faculty to replace those who have retired or are planning retirement in the near future. A viable recruitment technique that we use taps into the pool of teacher trainees after attending classes at Skyline.

Facilities, Equipment, Materials and Maintenance

- 1. Discuss the effectiveness of the facilities, equipment, equipment maintenance, and materials for the program to meet its goals and focus. Include if they impact success and if they are accessible to all students.*

There is continuous growth in the cosmetology program and as the trend continues, the job market will flourish through the 22nd century. New courses are being added on a regular basis. The evening cosmetology and esthetics programs have created a space problem in our existing Pacific Heights "swing" space. Cosmetology has literally outgrown the Pacific Heights "swing" facility. All attempts at remodeling and improving air quality and eliminating moldy conditions has not happened in spite of the numerous complaints from students and staff of health issues related to the facility. The cleanliness of the department is questionable as funds dry up for maintaining an adequate cleaning crew. The appearance and deplorable state of the educational facility has had a tremendous negative effect on the

success of the cosmetology students, staff and clients. However, the proposed move to the new facility is still a few months away.

2. *List projected needs.*

The upcoming move to the new building will definitely alleviate some of the problems identified above. The addition of "smart" classrooms, automated time and attendance system for students and airy, open spaces will definitely improve morale across the board.

3. *Describe the use of technology in the program and discuss if technology is current and comparable to other college and business or industry.*

Little or no state of the art technology is used in the existing facility. Therefore, it is not current and not comparable to other colleges or businesses.

4. *If appropriate, describe the support the program receives from industry. If the support is not adequate, what is necessary to improve that support?*

Skyline Cosmetology "industry" is currently the Advisory Board members who provide products, technical knowledge and some funding.

Budget Request

1. *What resources (staff, facilities, equipment and/or supplies) will be needed in the next six years?*

If the cosmetology/esthetics programs are to expand as it is expected, at least two (2) more certificated staff will be needed and at least three (3) instructor aides. When the program moves to the new building, we will have adequate space for expansion. For the next few months, conditions will probably not change. There continues to be a ventilation problem in Pacific Heights "swing" building. The ceilings continue to leak with rusted tiles falling from the ceiling. Repairs have been inadequate for many months. There is a continuous bad smell in the bathrooms and no amount of repairs seem to fix the problems.

2. *If appropriate, discuss methods the program could share resources with other programs in the College and District.*

Not appropriate at this time.

The cosmetology programs are either full time (8 hours per day; 5 days per week) or part-time (4 hours per evening; 4 days per week and all day Saturday). There is a very limited amount of time available for staff to participate in leadership roles at Skyline College.

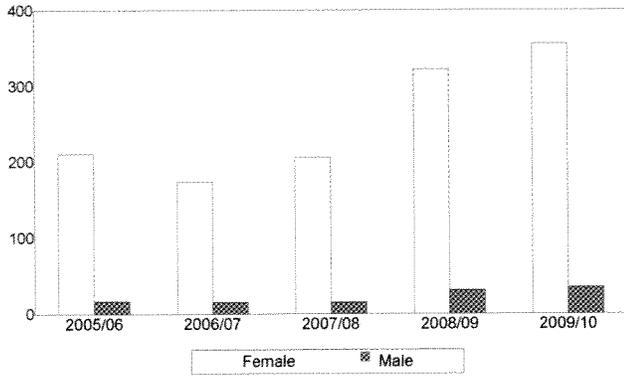

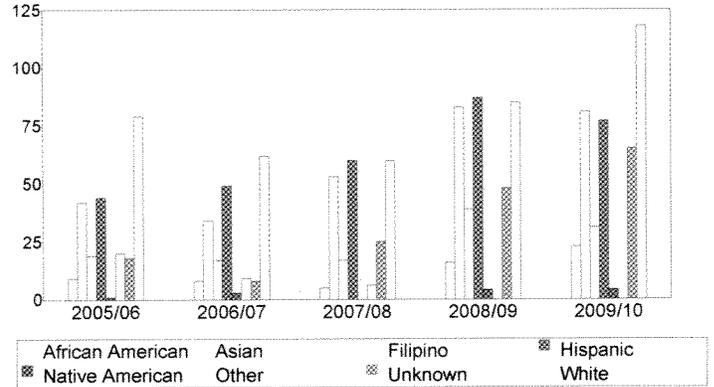

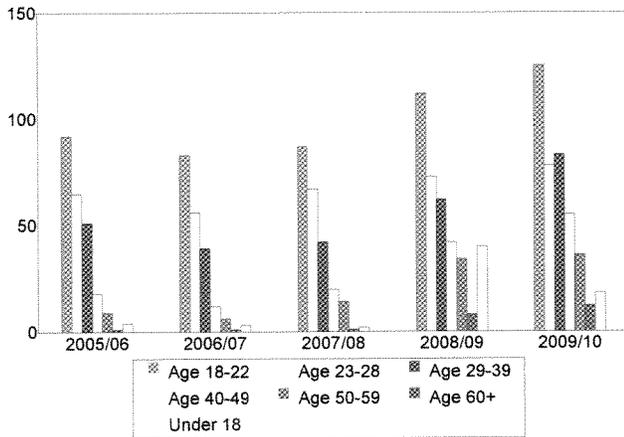
Unique Headcount by Gender



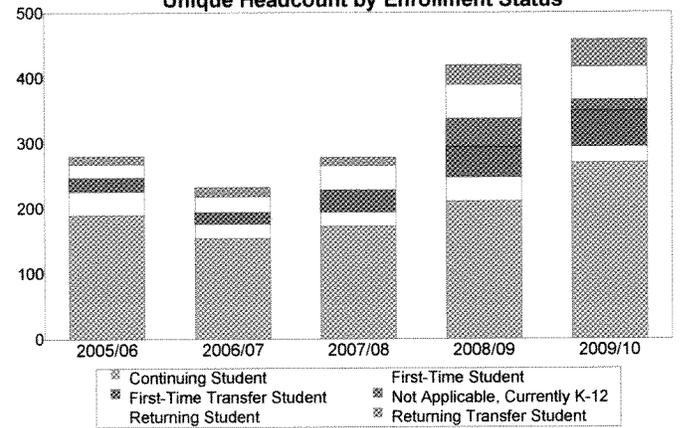
Unique Headcount by Ethnicity



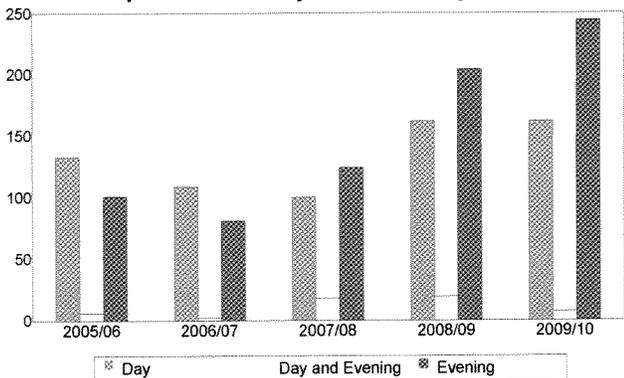
Unique Headcount by Student Age



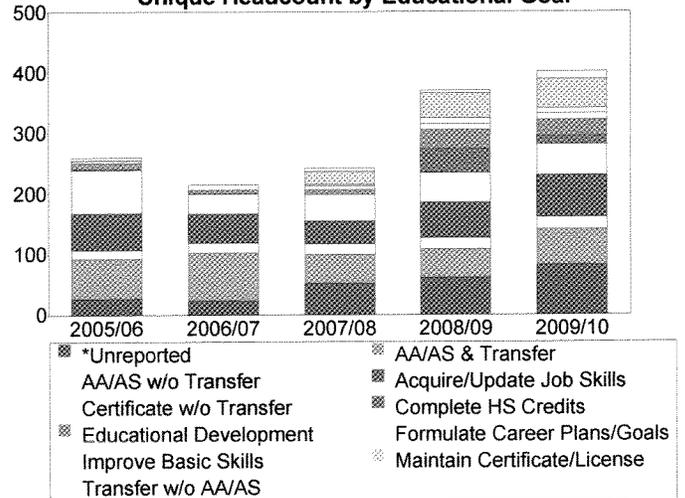
Unique Headcount by Enrollment Status



Unique Headcount by Course-Taking Pattern

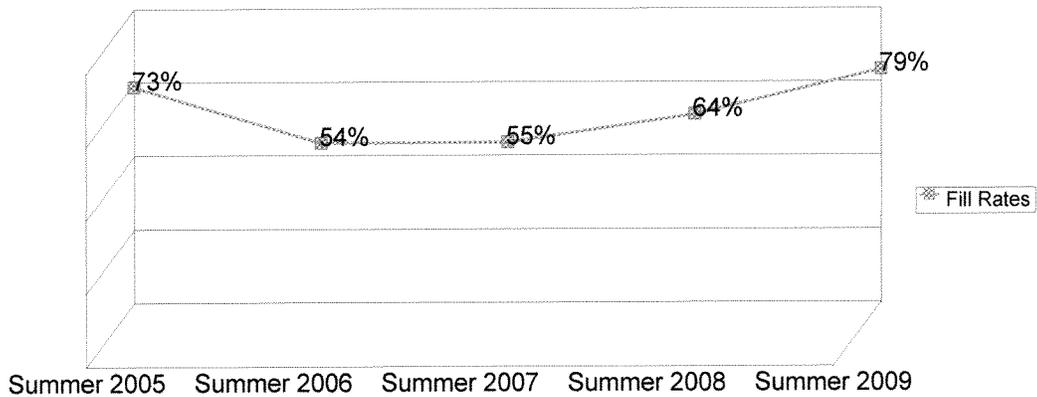
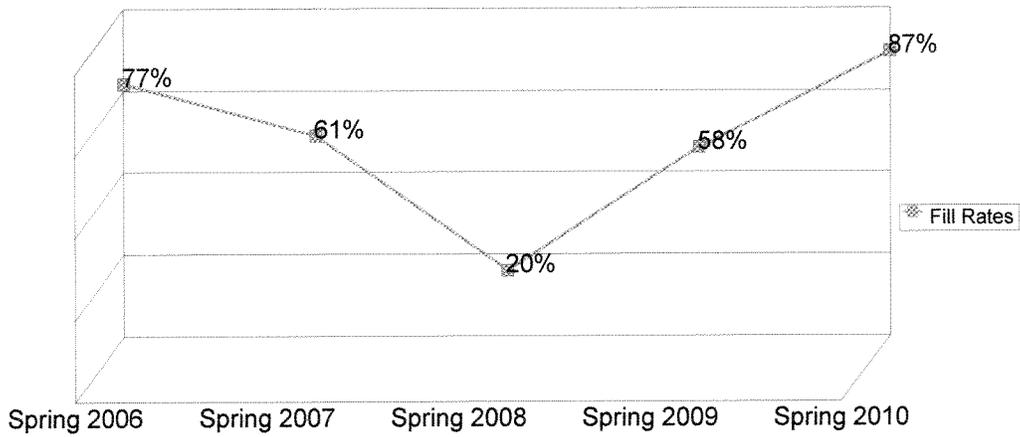
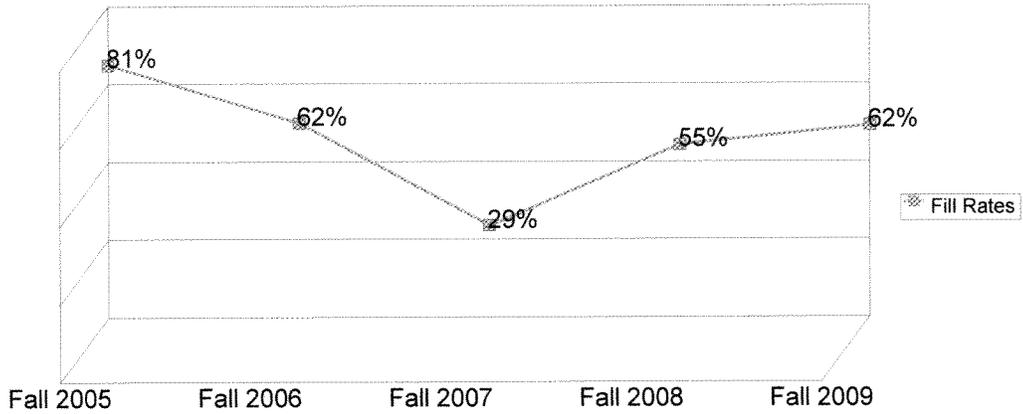


Unique Headcount by Educational Goal
